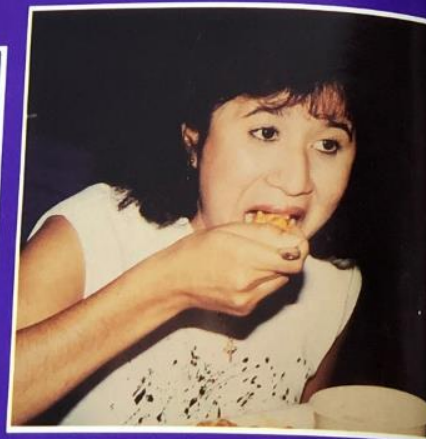

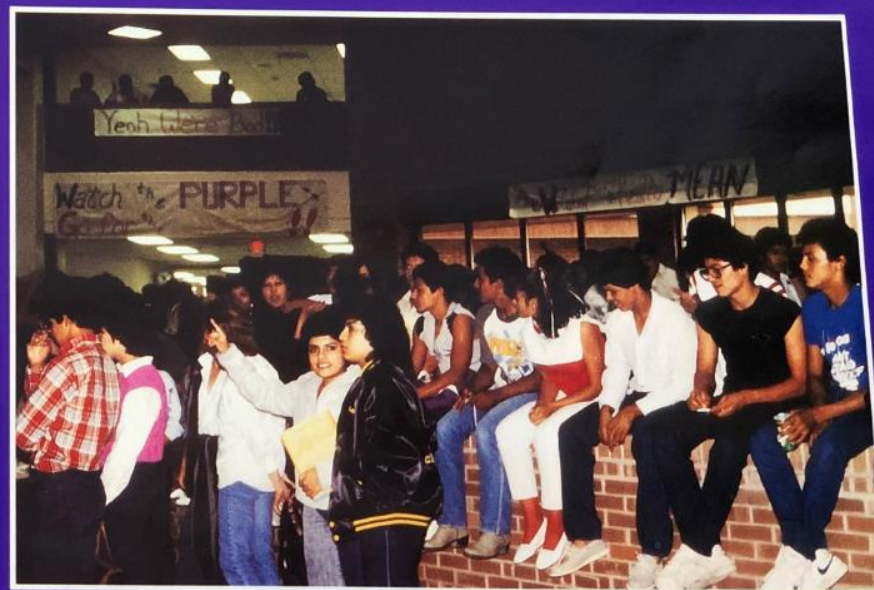

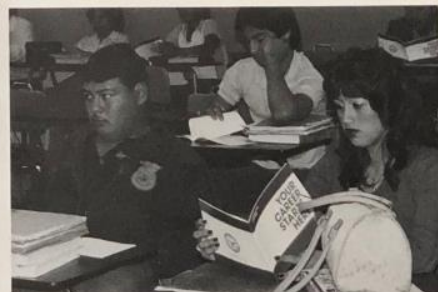

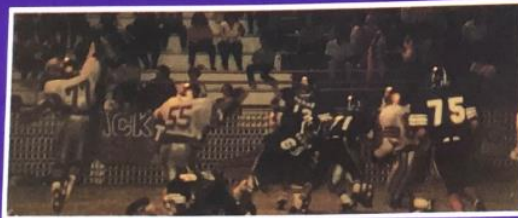

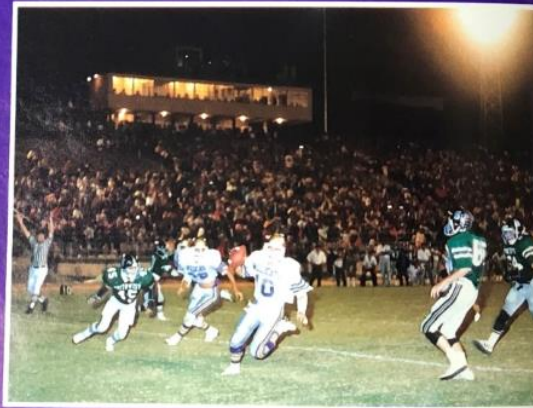

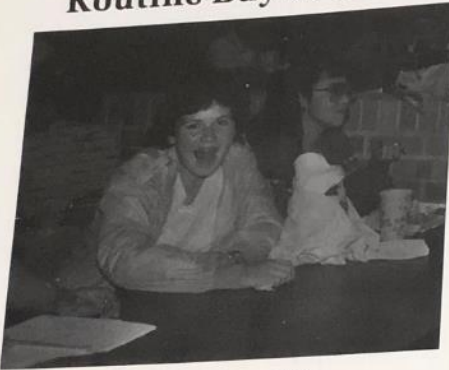

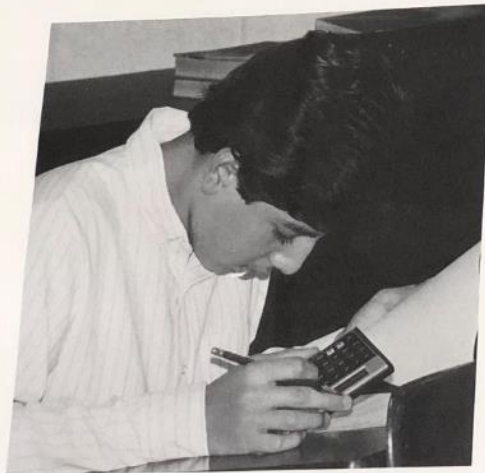

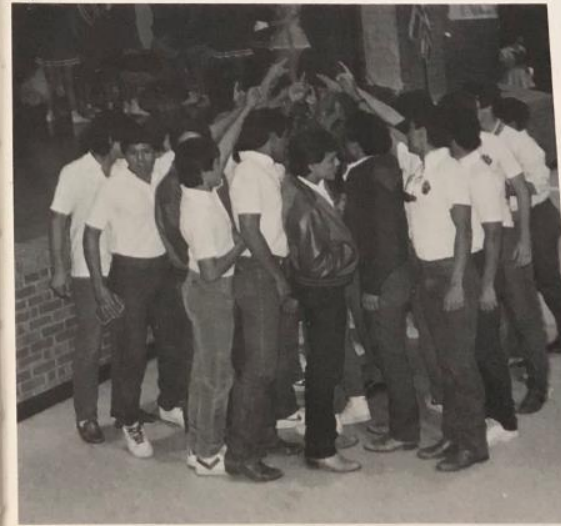

1985-86 was tough for drama students from the word go. The school year began and no drama teacher was on board to guide the students.

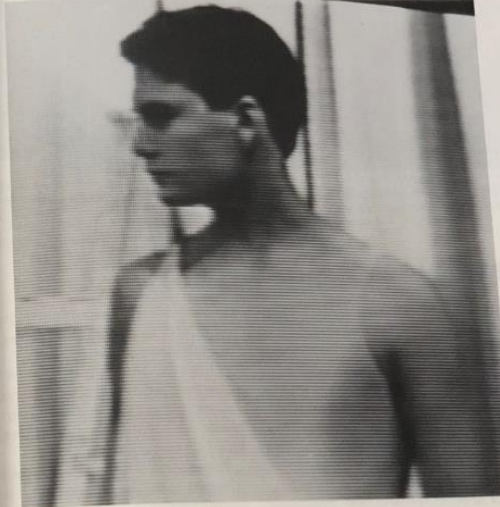
Librarian Mary Beth Powell

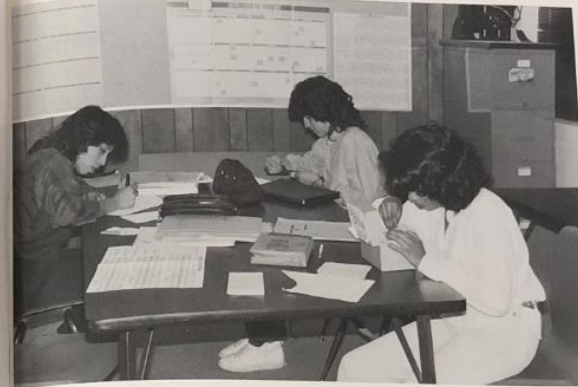

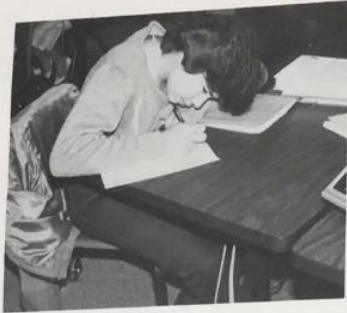

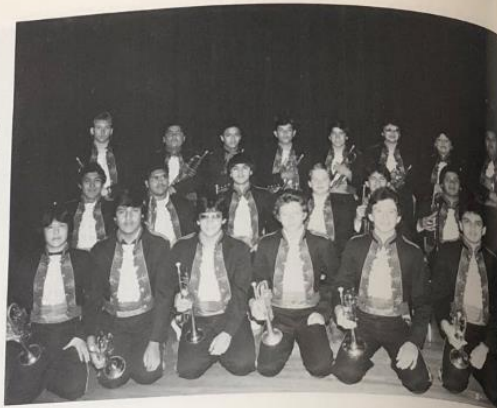

Many other students participated in U.I.L. events, band, drill team, and various other organizations. Having an early start their freshman year is preparation for being best their Senior year.

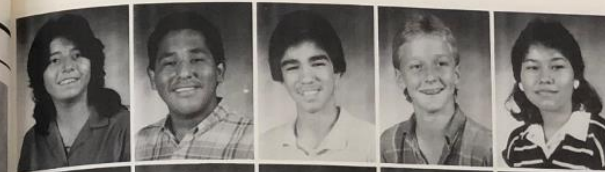

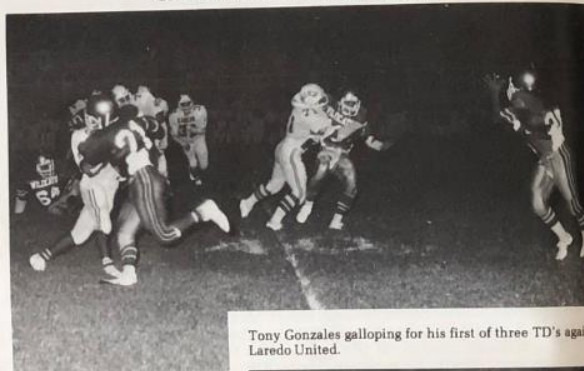

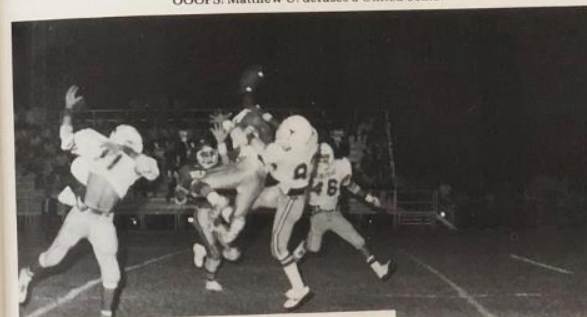
Horns Bite Dust

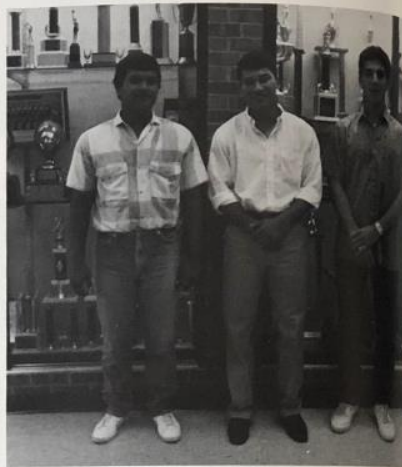

The Lady Wildcat basketball team surprised a few opponents, but not themselves, as they finished 2nd in the District Race, thus allowing them post-season play.

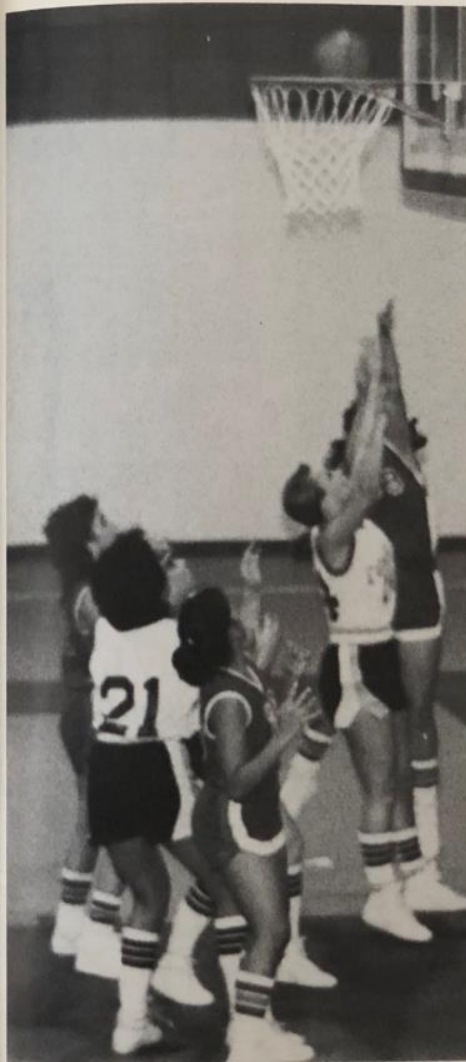

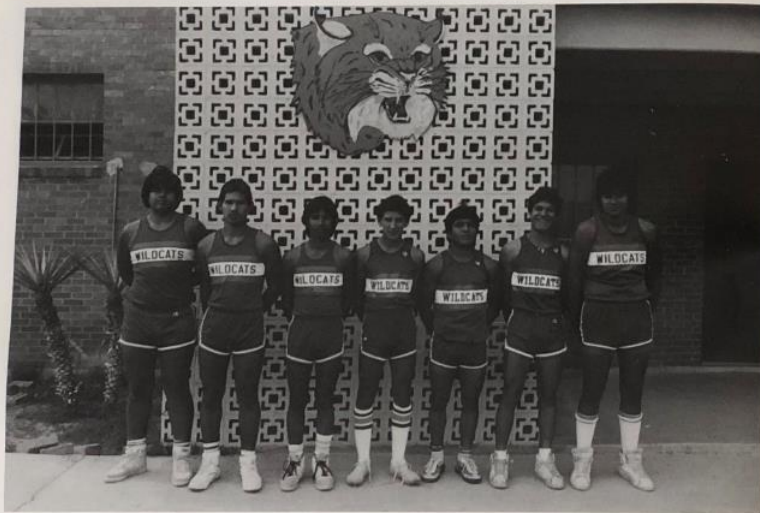

"Celebrate Life" Features "The Big Deal"

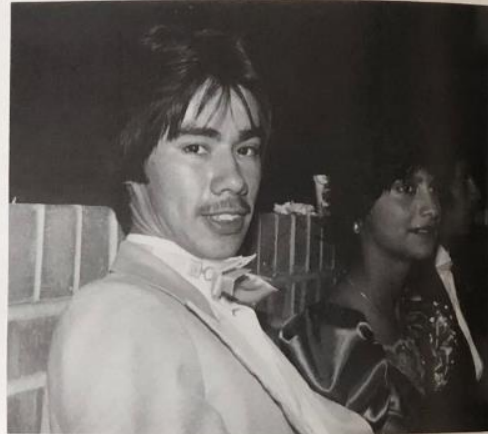

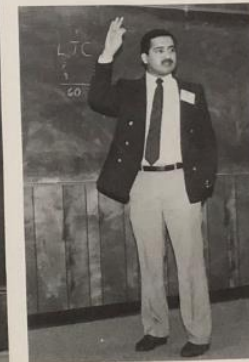

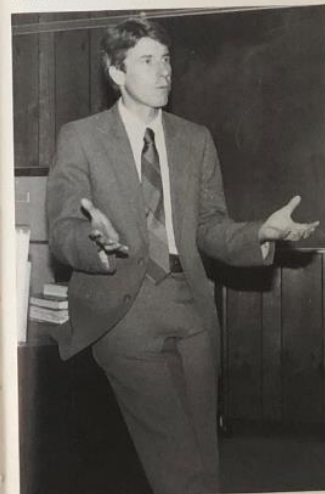

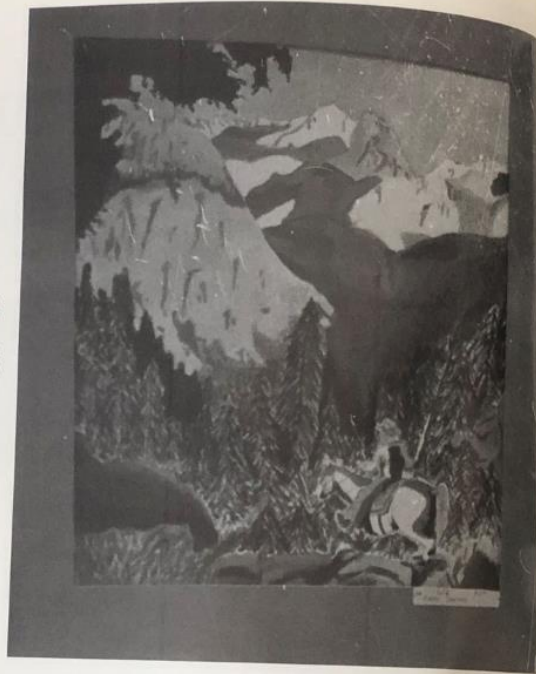
