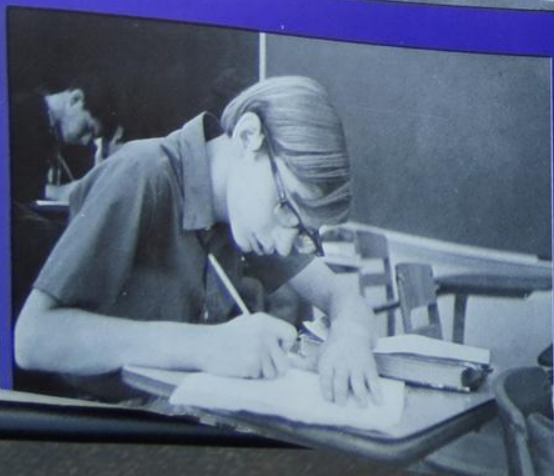
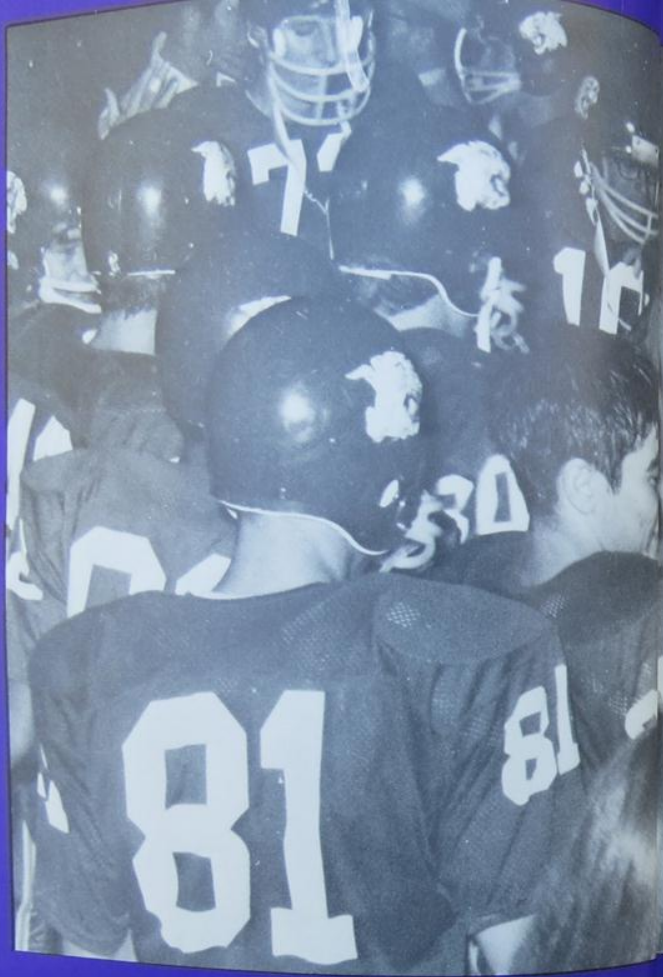

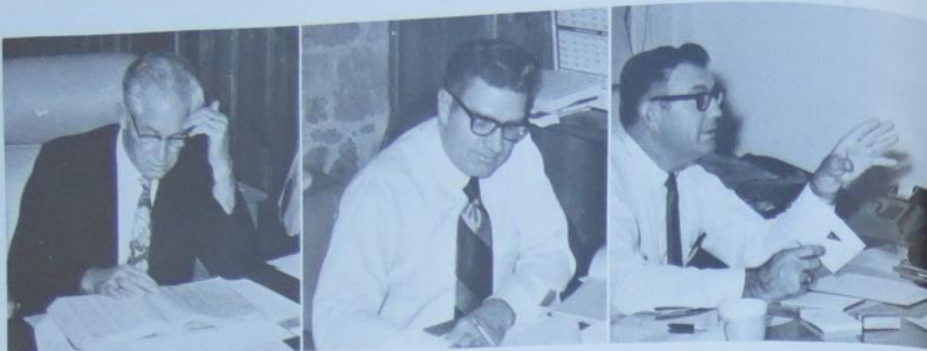

BAND BOOSTER CLUB MAKES MONEY

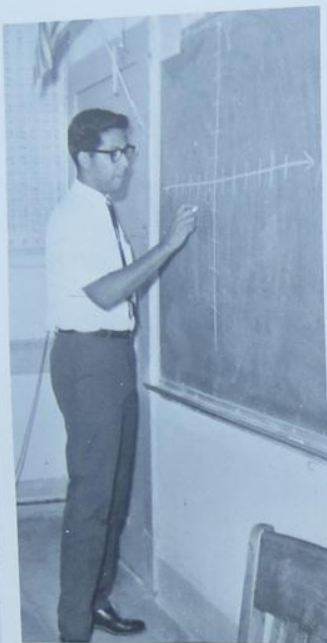

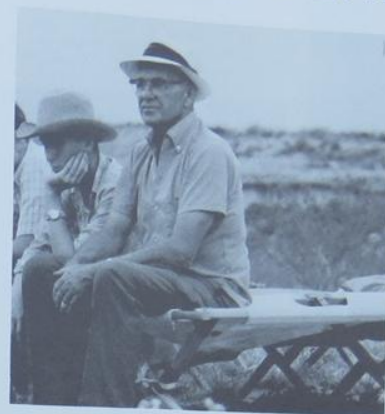

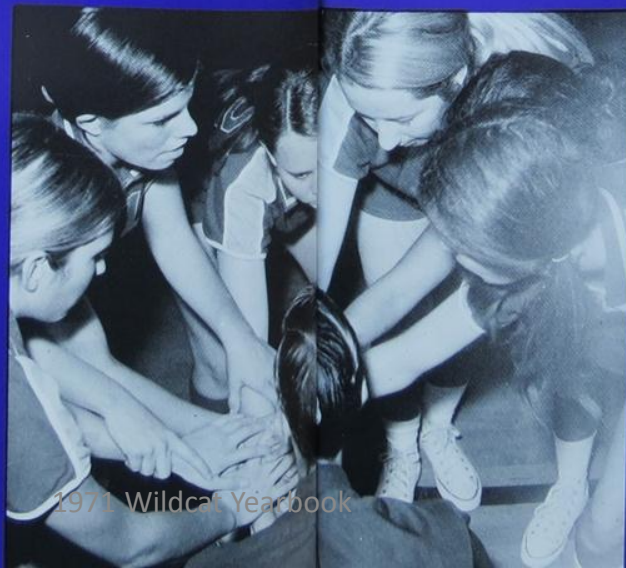
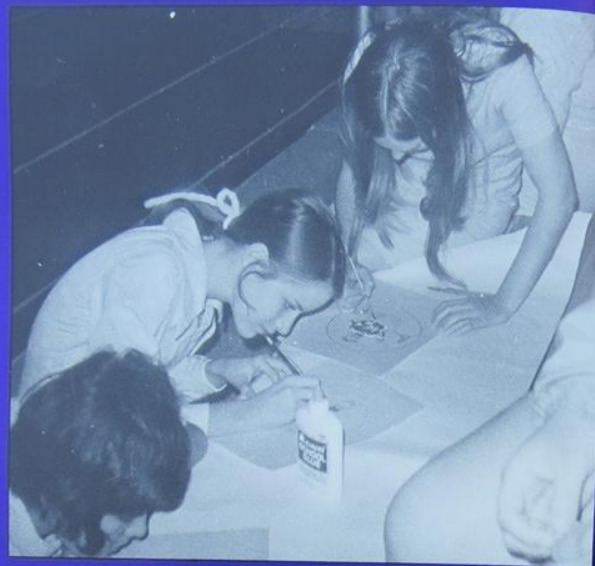

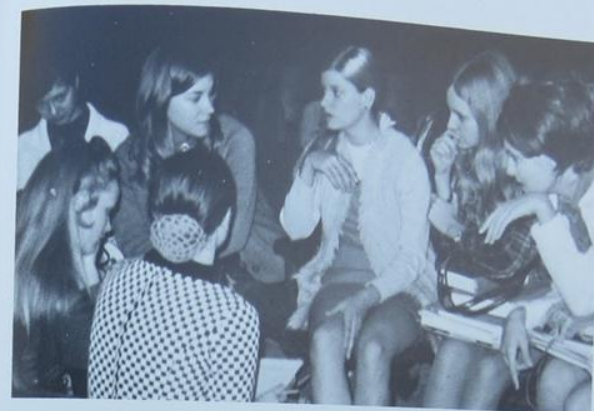

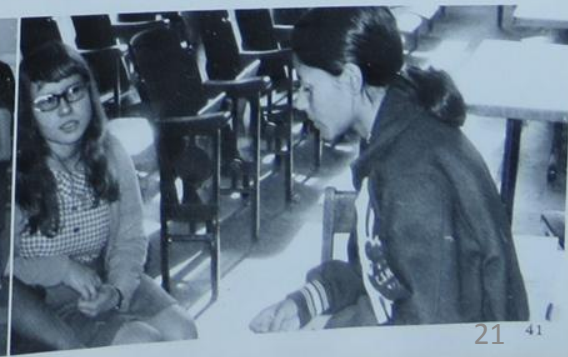

FOOTBALL TEAM WINS HONORS

The Carrizo Springs Wildcat football season began on September 11, 1970 when they played their traditional rivals, the Crystal City Javelins. The Cats came out on top with a victory of 25-6. They were led to victory by quarterbacks James Gibson and Johnny Estrada.

The second game of the year against the Del Rio Wildcats took place on September 18. The Cats collected their second victory with a score of 26-0. Charles Johnson led the scoring by making 20 of the 26 points.

On September 25 the Freer Buckaroos came to Carrizo. The Cats chalked up victory number three with a score of 13-0.

Again on October 2, the Wildcats claimed a 20-13 victory over the Pearsall Mavericks. The Carrizo Springs Wildcats then had four victories and no losses. Wildcat quarterback, Johnny Estrada, carried the ball fourteen times to gain ninety-eight yards.

The Cats went to Southwest near San Antonio to play the Dragons on October 9. Here again the Cats claimed a victory with a final score of 27-14.

making their season record 5-0. Full-back Nelson Hamilton led the Cats in yardage, gained. He gained a total of 186 yards and scored eighteen points.

On October 16, the Medina Valley Panthers came to the Wildcat stadium. Victory number six was gained by the Wildcats when they defeated the Panthers 35-14.

One of the most important games for Carrizo came on October 23 when the Cats played the Hondo Owls. Both teams had a 6-0 standing. The Cats attained victory seven with a final score of 34-23.

Victory number eight came to the Cats when they played the Poteet Aggies. Carrizo now had eight wins and no losses. The final score was Carrizo 37, Poteet 9. Hamilton scored three touchdowns for eighteen points, Johnson scored nine and Armstrong six.

The Wildcats' perfect record ended on November 6 when they met defeat at the hands of the Devine Warhorses. The final score was 10-3. The only score for Carrizo was made by Johnson who kicked one field goal in the first quarter.

The ninth victory came to Carrizo

on November 13. The Cats defeated the Cotulla Cowboys 27-18. Johnson scored twenty-one points and quarterback James Gibson scored six. This made the Carrizo Springs Wildcats the District 28-AA Co-Champs, sharing honors with Hondo, but going to bi-district because they had beaten Hondo in regular district play.

For the Bi-District Play-off, Carrizo played the Randolph Ro-Hawks. Randolph scored once. Carrizo won 27-8. The Cats' points came from Johnson scoring nine, Hamilton scoring six, and Perez scoring twelve.

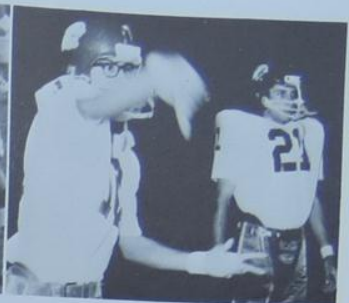
The Regional game was played against the Boling Bulldogs at the Mador Stadium in Seguin. The Bulldogs defeated the Cats 26-13. This put an end to the 70-71 football season for the Carrizo Springs Wildcats.

The Wildcats had never been class AA Bi-District champs and went to Regional in class A once in 1948. Now 22 years later the Cats get their victory. It was a long hard season for the players and Coaches.

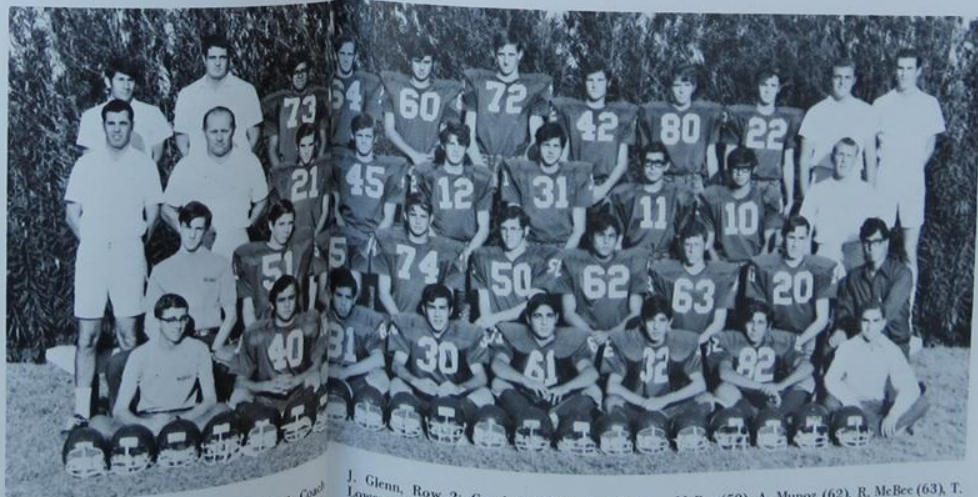

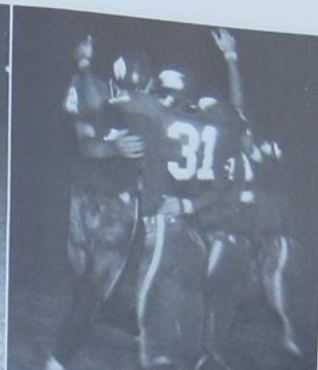

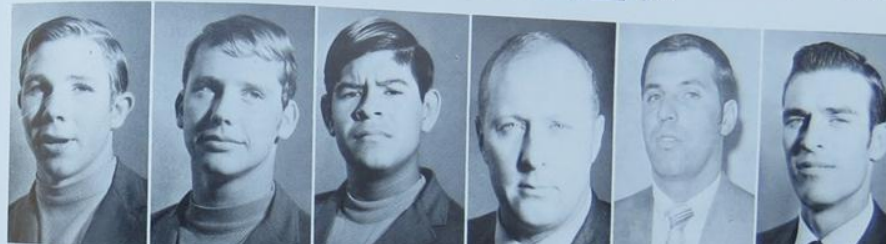

The lead changed hands again in the second quarter. Hondo made one field goal, one T.D., and one extra point for a lead of eight points. At the half, the score was 15-7.

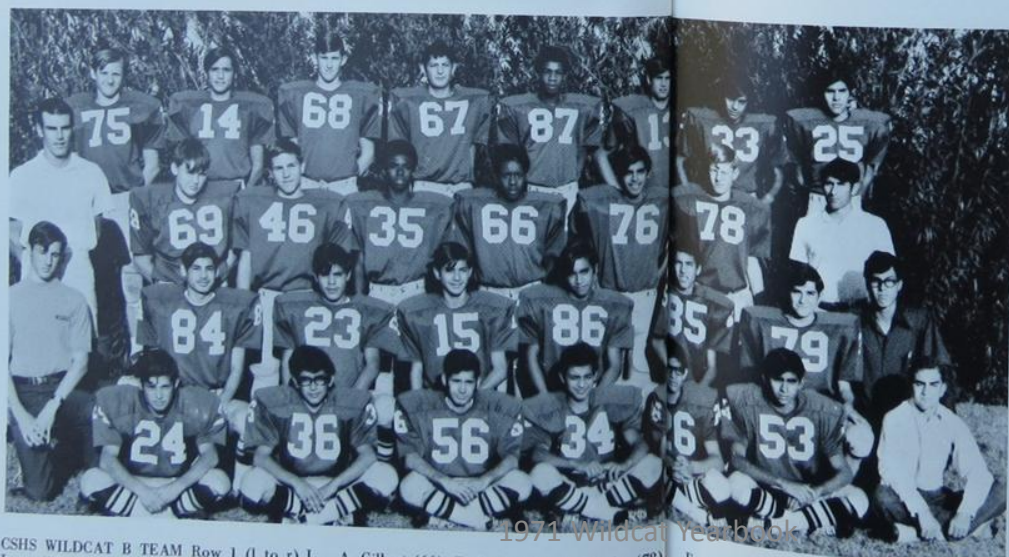

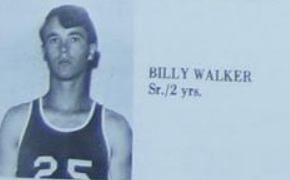

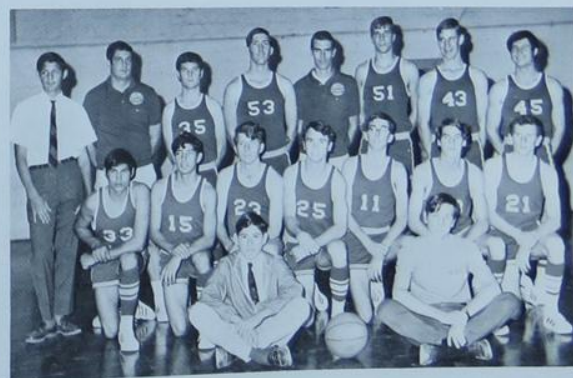
BASKETBALL SEASON SUCCESSFUL

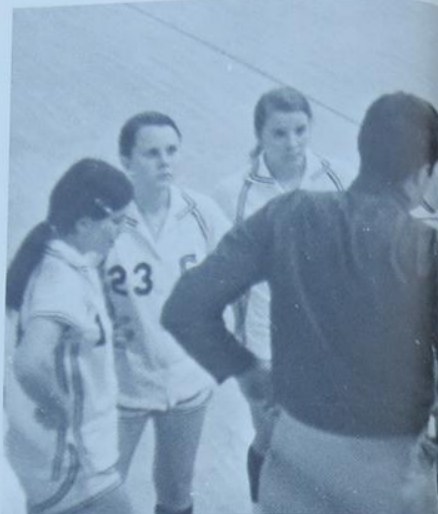

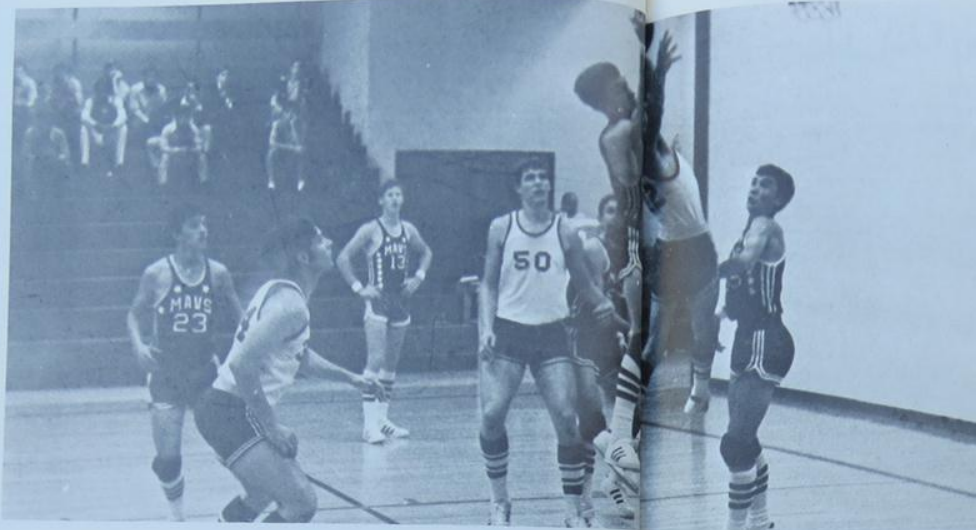

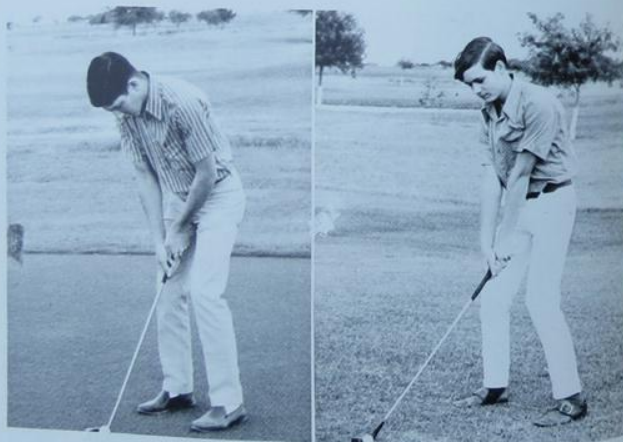

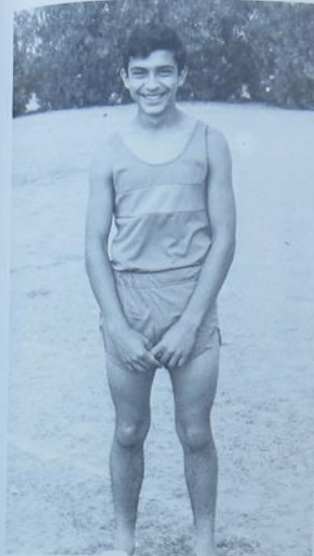

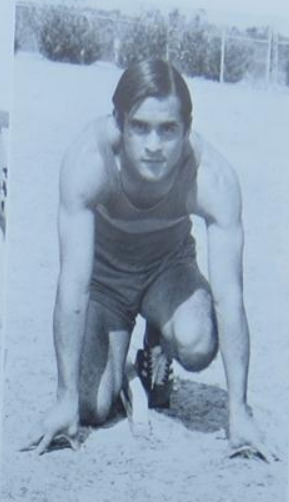

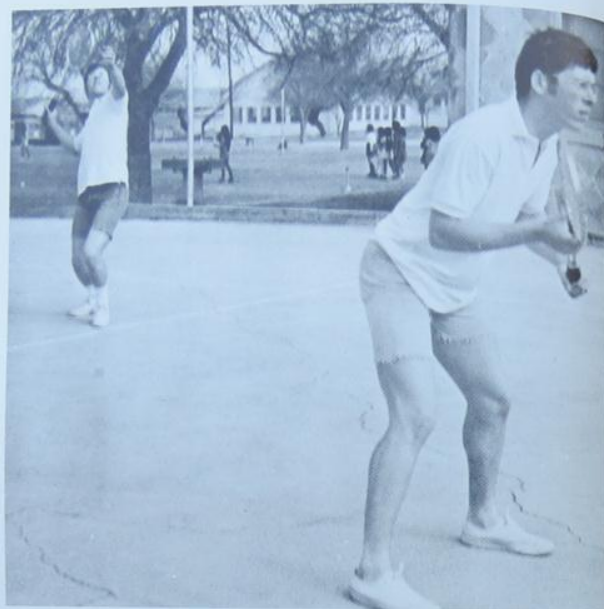

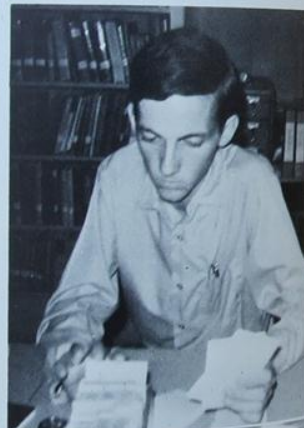

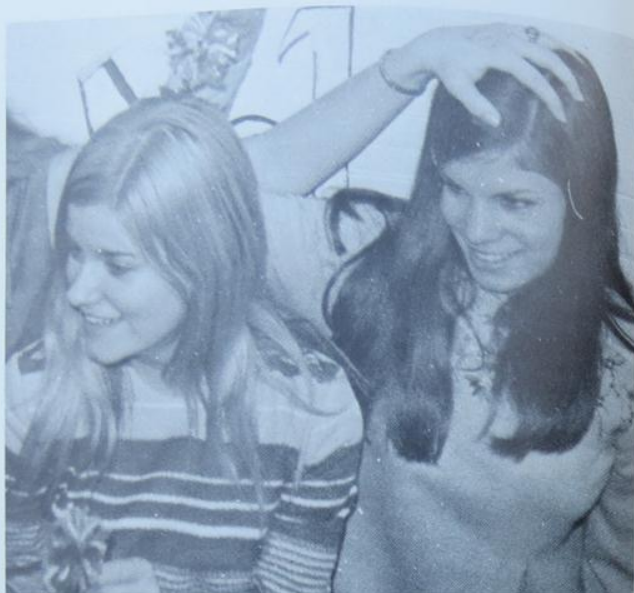

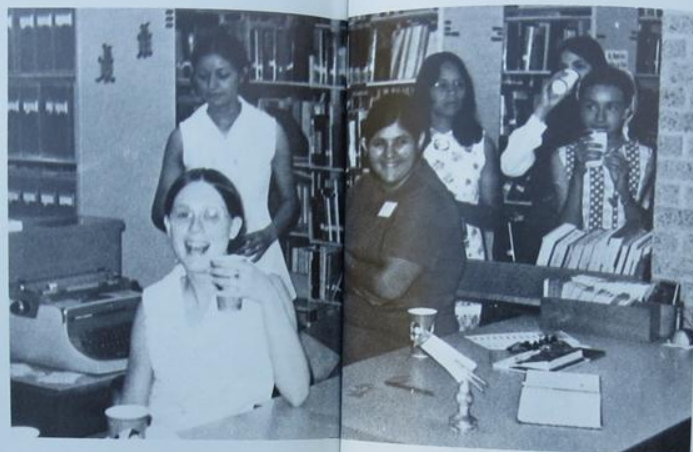
