


DEDICATION




THREE JOIN ENGLISH DEPARTMENT





One purpose of vocational agriculture has been to teach the students handicrafts such as welding and carpentry. The workshop was used by these boys in the past two years under the directorship

of Mr. David Starr. More tools were made available, and more work benches were added. This greatly improved the working facilities of the workshop, F.F.A. members participated in a leadership contest, grass judging, livestock judging, and meat judging. 




