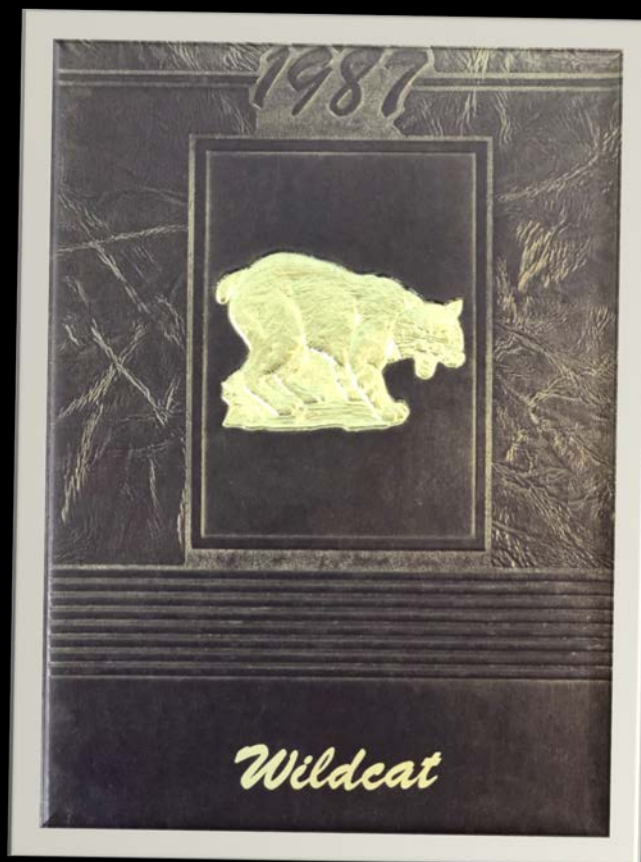

We can conquer the impossible dream, if we remember our goals as a team

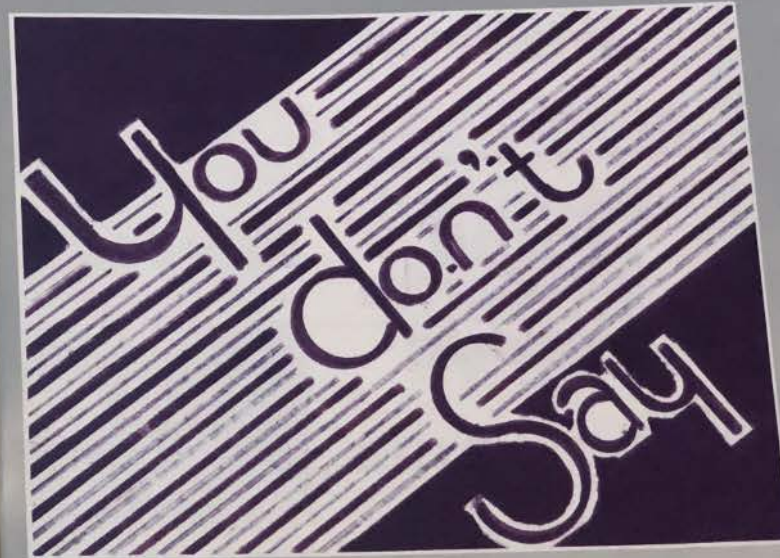

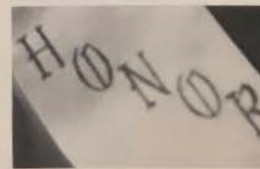

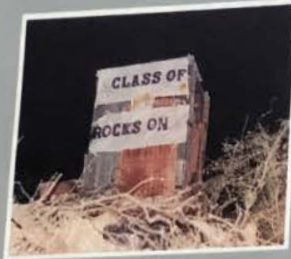

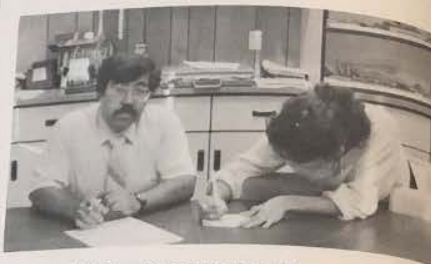
The 1987 staff was made up from three classes. The enrollment in the journalism classes more than doubled over last year.

It costs about \$40 to print each yearbook, so the \$18 price students pay is a real bargain.

The future holds a lot of promise for even better things.

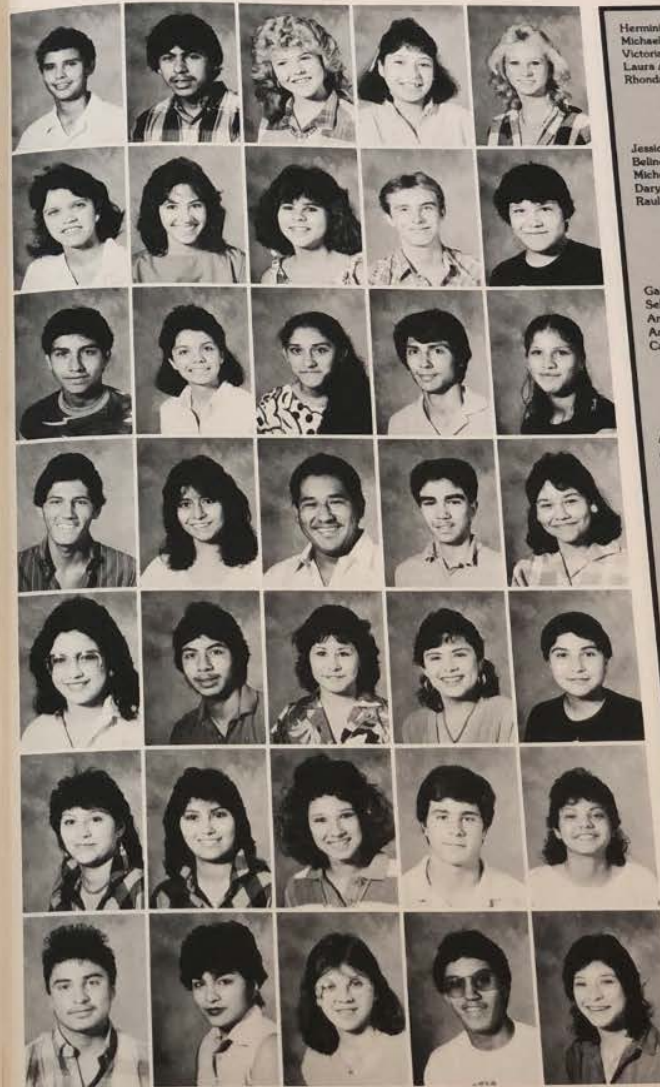

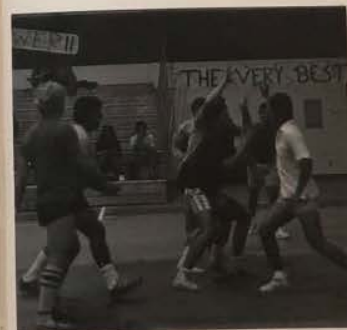

Memorial (36-6) and Kennedy (13-12).

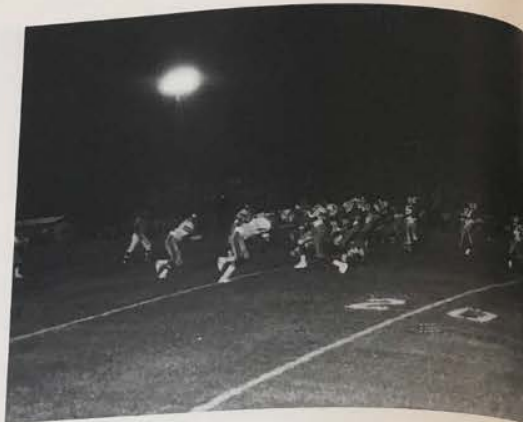
Afterwards, Alamo Heights and West Campus handed the Cats their next two defeats, but all wasn't lost.

Lady Wildcats Make Play-offs Again . . .

The Lady Wildcats were kept from the District 14-AAAA Championship Title by the two games they lost to the 14-0 Pleasanton Eaglettes. Nevertheless, a 12-2 District finish was good to make the state play-offs, where they battled the Fredericksburg Billies in Bi-District competition. They ended their season 22-8, averaging 62.6 points per game.

Season highlights were the 107 point game at home against Memorial (on the same night the Wildcats also passed the century mark scoring 111—a Carrizo Springs first.) Against Southwest the Lady Cats grabbed a record 50 steals, while against Edgewood the 'Cats combined for a spectacular 70 rebounds in one game. Against Kennedy, the Lady Cats displayed the teamwork and unselfishness by dishing out 32 assists.

Individually, Diana "Lo" Lozano was the team's top scorer with a 16.3 average, followed by Shawn Caver who averaged 14.7 points. Diana was also the leader in assists and steals with 4.4 and 8.3 averages respectively. Coming in at second in these categories were Nelly Garza with a 2.1 average in steals and Luisa Sevilla with 3.8 average in assists.

Top rebounders were Shawn Caver and Velma McNeil with averages of 9.2 and 7.1 respectively, followed by Angie Castilleja and Terry Arias with five rebounds per game. Stephanie Hodges was moved to varsity at mid-season and made her mark in steals and assists, while proving to be a very

aggressive defensive player. Debbie Ortiz was an all around utility player coming off the bench with a clear head and an awareness of the situation at hand when called on to play.

The Lady Wildcats garnered honors at the Hondo Tournament where they took 3rd place and Diana Lozano was named to the All Tournament team. The 'Cats then took 2nd at their own invitational tournament. At the end of the season Diana "Lo" Lozano and Shawn Caver were named members of the 14-AAAA All District Team, while teammates Luisa Sevilla, Nelly Garza, and Velma McNeil received 2nd team All District honors. Lozano was also named to the Region IV All Regional Team by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches.

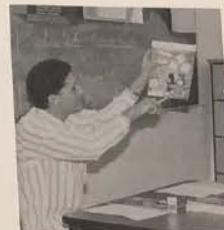

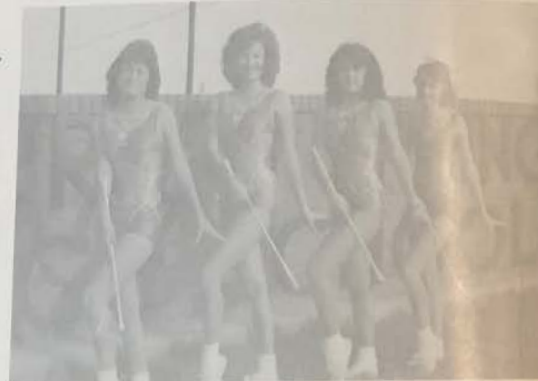
