This was the energetic phrase created by Head Coach Don Tate, which referred to the fiery display of effort and team work which the 79 Wildcats displayed throughout season.



Although the cats started on a victorious note, they could not keep their drive alive as they lost the next three games to Laredo United, Southwest, and Hebbronville. On October 5, the Wildcats traveled to Fredericksburg for a close encounter with the battling Billies. The final score of the contest was a 7-7 tie, as the Cats ruined the Billies hopes of a successful Homecoming.


During the next weeks of practice, the Cats elected Victor Garcia as the team's sole captain. Garcia had been on varsity for the past three years and played tight end for the Wildcats. Honorary captains were also chosen weekly for every game.

The following game, the team battled stubbornly against the Kerrville Antlers. Their effort was to no avail as the Antlers crushed the Wildcats 42-7. October 19, was known as Invasion Day. The determined Cats invaded Cougar country and won their first district game by a score of 27-12. The next two games were played at Wildcat stadium against St. Anthony Yellowjackets and Pleasanton Eagles. In the first game, the Cats demolished the Yellowjackets 32-6, while against Pleasanton, the Wildcats were not so fortunate. The Wildcats were stunned with a 20-6 Homecoming loss to the Eagles. For the last game of the season, the Cats were to play the Coyotes of Uvalde and it seemed as though the Cats luck ran out as the Coyotes came from behind, to defeat the Wildcats of 79, 20-8. "FABULOUS FISH"






TWO OUT OF THREE


The Wildcat volleyballers powered their way through a most difficult season as the team strived for perfection but more often than not came up just a trifle short.



"Next year," quips one individual as those dying embers will again rekindle into flames and hopes of a district crown.








"ABILITY, BREAKS, AND COURAGE." Never were more meaningful a three words invented that described the 1979-1980 season, as inexperience played the important factor.






"The 79 Version"














The "Mean Purple Band" featured yet another extravaganza with the addition of the 79-80 version of the Wildcat Corps.




GIRLS
