The English department stressed the importance of using good English in writing as well as speaking. The department was the largest CSHS had ever had. The English teachers were: (standing) MRS. KRISTI HORTON, English IV; MRS. GERRY DRAPER, English II and IV; MRS. ELIZABETH MEADOWS, English I; (sitting) MRS. LINDA LEETH, English I and Speech; MRS. FRANCES GROGAN, English III; and MS. 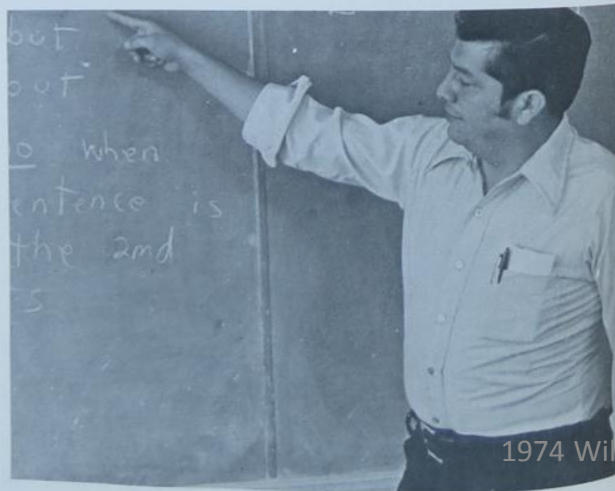
sophomore classes concentrated on studying the fundamentals of grammar and writing, while the junior and senior classes learned to apply these skills.

Art

MRS. KRISTI HORTON taught art to twenty students. She tried to teach them the basic fundamentals without hampering the creativity of the student. Her students did drawings, watercolors, pastels and sculpture and displayed them in the library at the end of each semester.

Spanish

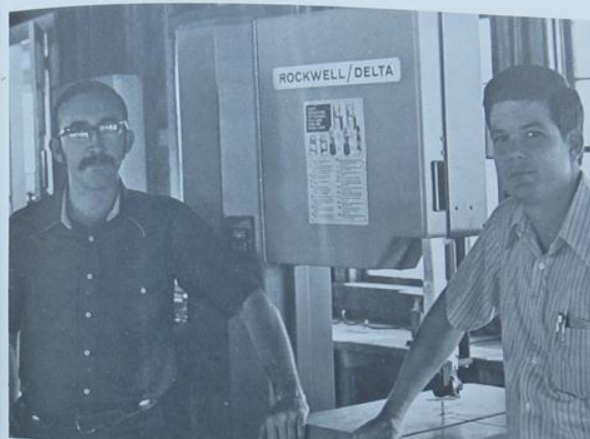
The Spanish department provided credits in foreign language, which is essential to enter college. MR. SANTOS NIETO, who taught Spanish I and II, was aided by filmstrips and records. MRS. LINDA LEETH, who was a new addition to the department, taught a class of Spanish I.



Vocational Skills

The homemaking department prepared many girls to be ideal homemakers. MRS. BEVERLY GEORGE taught Homemaking III and directed the Homemaking Co-op Program which was designed to allow senior girls to work half a day at jobs connected with homemaking. MRS. KAREN LEHMAN taught Homemaking II and Home and Family Living. MRS. GWEN MCMURRY taught Home-making I.

The vocational agriculture department was headed by MR. DAVID STARR, who taught Vocational Ag. I and III. MR. SAMMY ALLEN taught Vocational I and II. The Vocational Agriculture Co-op Program was introduced into the department last year. Senior boys participating in this program worked half a day at various farm jobs.



The commercial department taught students business skills. MRS. NONA LOWERY taught Typing I. She also taught Bookkeeping. Two new calculators assisted students with this numeric subject. MRS. BARBARA LANSFORD, Typing I and II and Shorthand instructor, commented that for the first time the department had visual aids which correlated with the new textbooks. MRS. ELIZABETH STEPHENSON taught Recordkeeping.



P. E. and Health

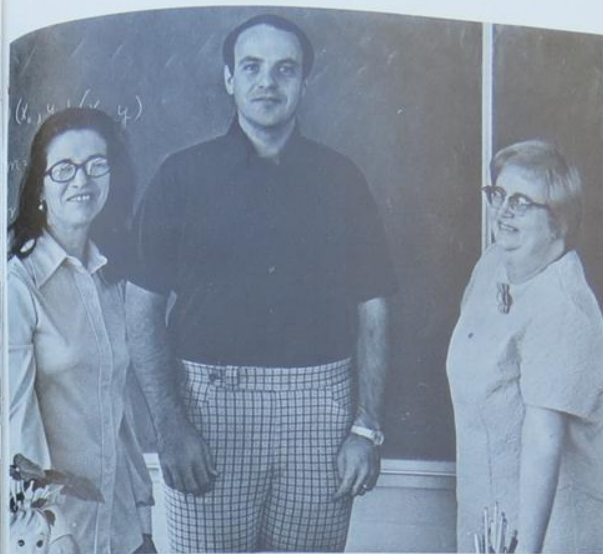
The physical education and health department's goal was to build and strengthen their students' bodies as well as instruct them about personal hygiene and health. MR. RONNIE WILBURN taught Boys' P.E. MR. FRANK NAYOLA taught Boys' P.E. and Health. MR. TONY CUMPIAN also taught Boys' P.E. and Health. MRS. TERESA WAGNER was the Girls' P.E. and Health instructor.

Science

The science department tried to widen the students' interests in the field of science. MR. CHARLES RIHA, the Biology teacher, taught his students about the make-up of living things. MR. HENRY COLEMAN, who taught Physical Science, was serious in trying to teach young adults the physical phenomena of the earth. MRS. YVONNE DARTER, in teaching Chemistry and Physics, made use of the lab to conduct numerous experiments. MR. MIKE HORTON taught Physical Science.

Mathematics

In the field of mathematics, the teachers were: MRS. OBDULIA BENDELE, who taught Algebra II, Plane and Analytical Geometry, and Trigonometry; MR. JEROME GLASS, who taught Algebra I and II; MRS. ELIZABETH ELLIS and MRS. ALICE BLACKWELL, who both taught FOM I and II. Fundamentals of Math was a simplified form of mathematics that replaced Related Math. The math teachers' philosophy was to encourage students to think independently.

Social Studies

The social studies department made a special effort to get students interested in current events. MR. JACK RAY, who taught American and World History, believed that history was essential to people of all walks of life. MRS. WINNELL ALBRECHT taught Civics and Economics. Her Civics classes dramatized how a Congressional bill becomes a law. MRS. PAULA HARLIN, who taught American and Texas History, and World Geography; and MR. JOE PHILLIPS, who taught American History, both commented that they felt that their students were remarkable in their sincere interest in what is happening in the world today and how current events correlate with the past.

Library

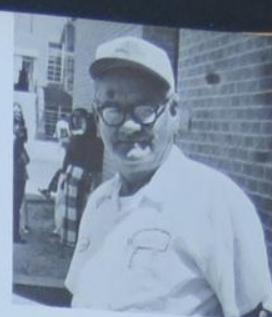
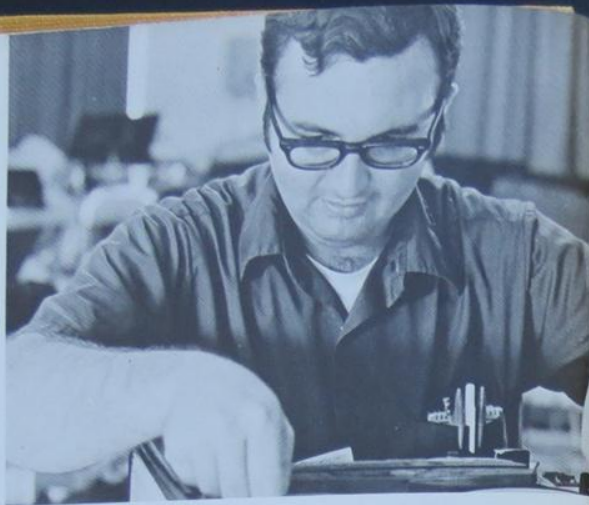

Seniors Provide Backbone for School Pride

Determination and hard work were the two traits that characterized the senior class of 1974. Their class, for the past four years, has shown their desire to build up pride in CSHS.

Thirteen senior men played varsity football during the season. Elifonso Esquivel and Hector Saenz were named to the all-district team. These seniors have worked and played together as a true team for the past four years and most of them have been varsity players all four years. Seniors were the backbone of the varsity basketball team. The team compiled a 13-18 record behind the balanced attack of Eli Esquivel, Hector Saenz, Wiley Perkins, Ruben Lopez and Frank Ponce. In girls' basketball Lou Ella Hodges was the leading scorer. During the season she captured 530 points for a 22.8 average. Kay Kingsbery was second with 296 points. They were backed up by Dalia Lozano and Dalia Romero. The varsity volleyball team consisted of six senior girls. Kay Kingsbery was chosen to be on the All-District volleyball team. The track team had two seniors go to the State Relays. Albert Perales once again won first in district, regional, and for the second year in a row was named state champion in the mile run. Arturo Juarez placed second at the regional meet in the 440 yd. run. Other seniors on the track team were Elifonso Esquivel, Robert Martinez, Willie Santoya and Ruben

Lopez. Frank Guerra and Marcie Jackson placed first in the district tennis meet and advanced to regional. Frank and his partner made it all the way to the finals before being defeated by the defending state champs. Ray Guerra and Rolando Jasso were other seniors on the tennis team.

Seniors were found in every organization. Kenzie Box was head-cheerleader and was supported by senior cheerleaders Dalia Romero and Marcie Jackson. Lou Ella Hodges was named co-captain of the drill team. Other members included Veronica Juarez, Kay Kingsbery and Joan Wilson.

Seniors contributed much to the spirit of the band and seniors lead the way through competition. Donna Farris served as drum majorette and Deanya Bolin was a senior twirler. Marcie Jackson, Stephen John and Marsha Tollett made the all-district band. Marcie and Stephen went on to the regional meet and made the all-region band. For the second year Stephen was eligible to advance to the area tryouts and compete. Marsha Tollett made the area tryouts in choir. Seven seniors brought back first-place medals from the solo and ensemble contest. They were Donna Farris, Albert Perales, Marcie Jackson, Allen Taylor, Marsha Tollett, and Stephen John. All of them were eligible to compete on the state level.

For the past three years the FFA Sweetheart has been from this class. This year's

sweetheart was Cathy Stephenson. Marcie Jackson represented the senior FHA Chapter as a member of the State Chorus. For the first year in intramurals, the "Super Seniors" won first place. At the All-Sports Banquet, Elifonso Esquivel was named Best Boy Athlete and Kay Kingsbery was named Best Girl Athlete. Albert Perales was awarded the Mickey Kolos Fighting Heart Award and Hector Saenz was awarded the Jeff English Sports Award.

The senior class hosted a Senior vs. Faculty Basketball game in order to raise money for end-of-year activities. Even though the faculty was victorious, everyone enjoyed the fun and antics of each team.

The senior class of '74 was the last graduating class from the old building. As they left, they carried experiences and memories with them, but left their deeds behind for all to see.

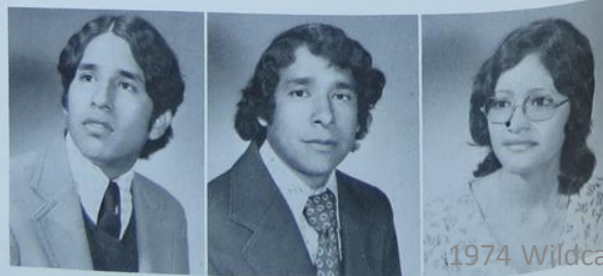

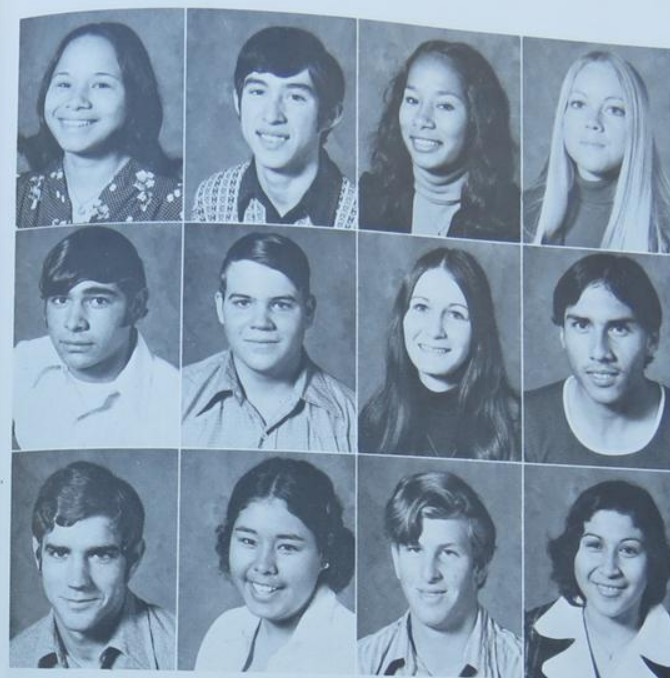

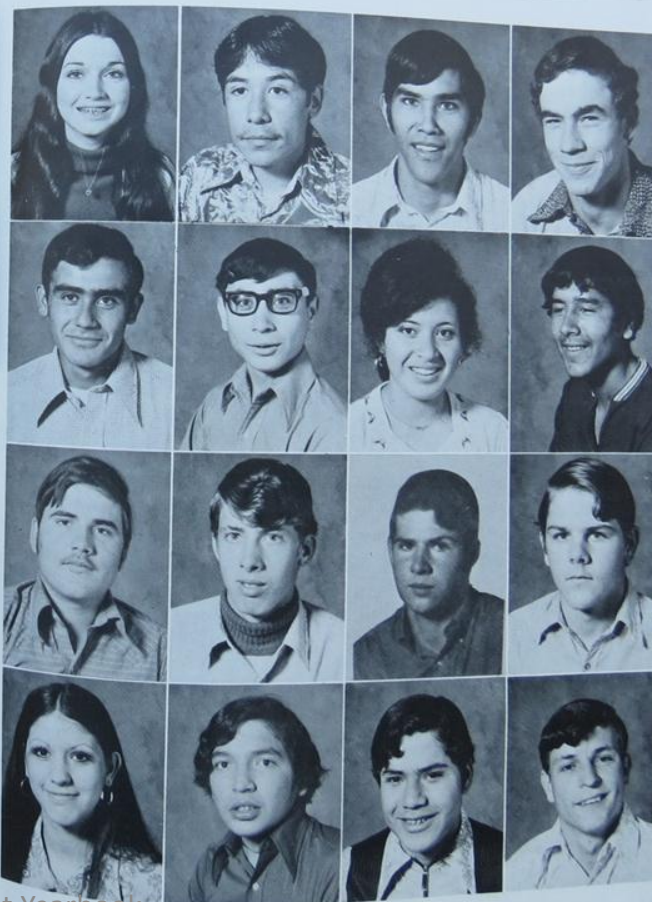
The sophomores of the 73-74 school year showed what they were really made of and also they proved that they were "students of their own time and also of their own mind."

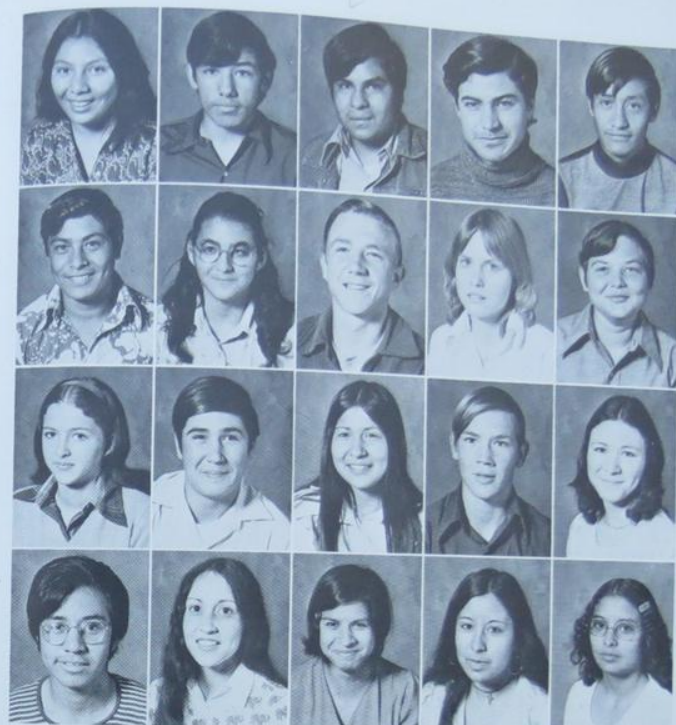

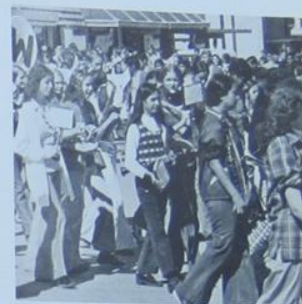

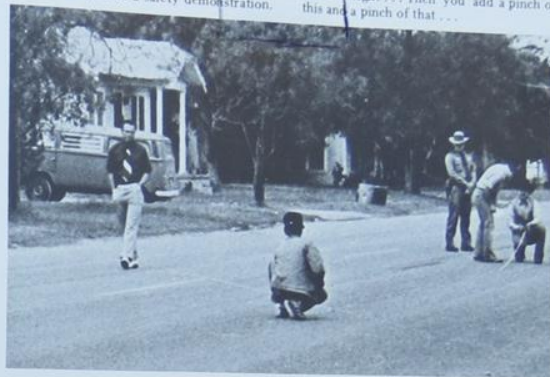

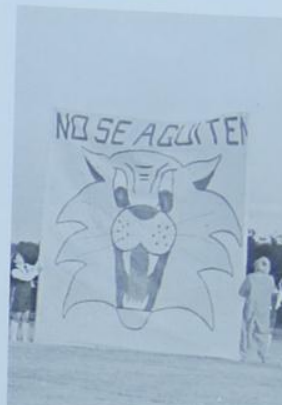

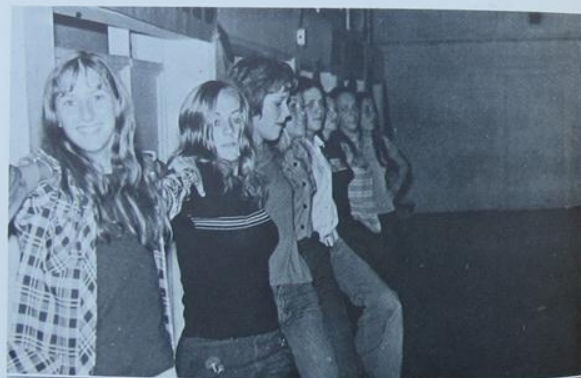

Future Farmers of America Participate in Soil Survey Demonstration

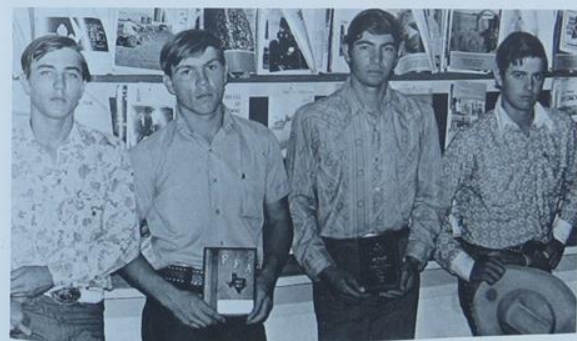

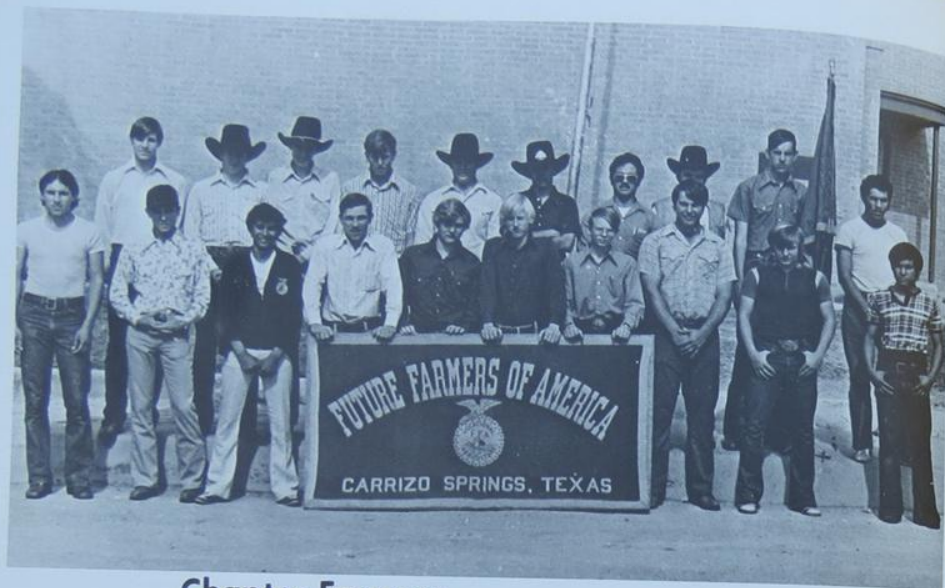

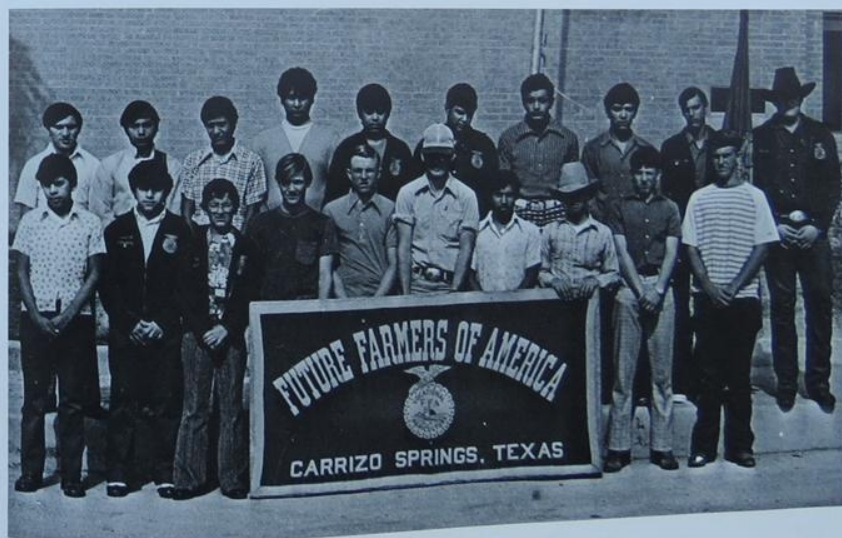

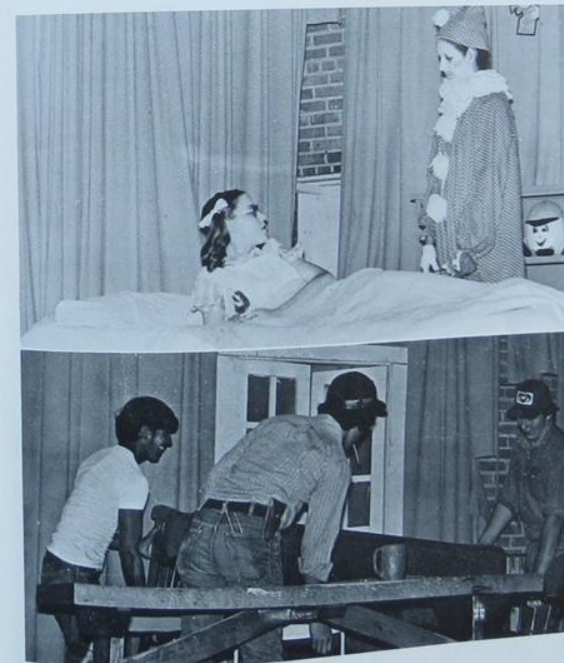

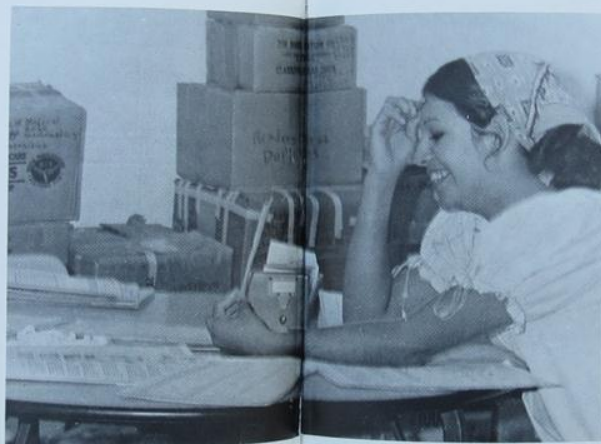

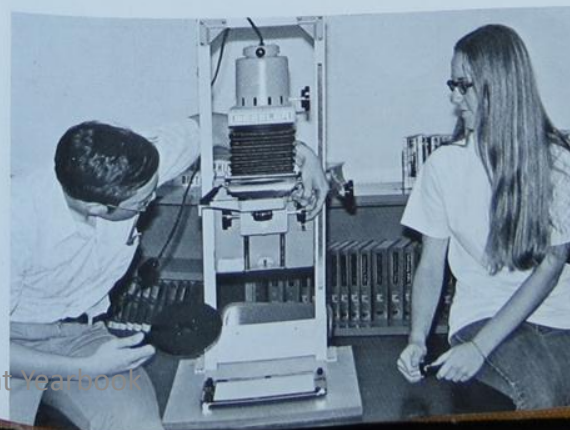

The CSHS Coaches felt the 1973 football season was successful, even though they did not have a good "win-loss record." Out of the varsity, junior varsity, and freshmen, 104 men went out for football and at the end of the season there were still 100 playing.

The Varsity's record was 2-8. They defeated the Junction Eagles and the Cotulla Cowboys, but up until the last two games, the Cats had out-scored their opponents 111-103.

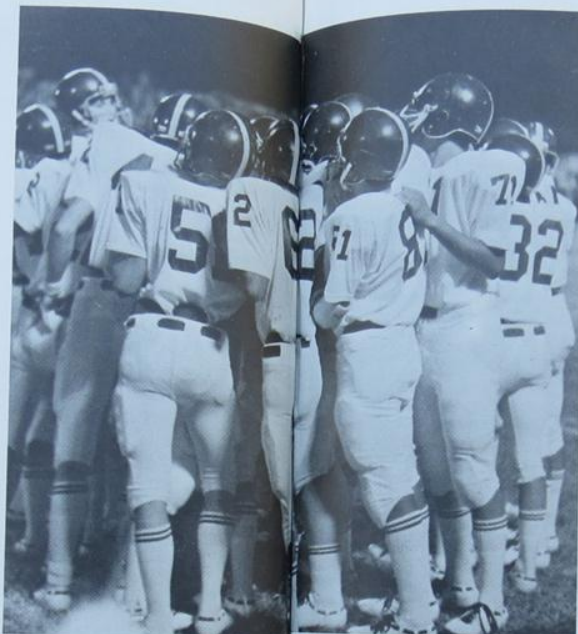
The Wildcats "passed" Junction to a loss with a score of 28-6. The Wildcat defense was up to its tops allowing Junction to score only two first downs.

Carrizo ripped Cotulla 33-6 at the

Out of our hard-working team, two were named as outstanding players state-wide. Billy John was named to the Class AA all-state second team as an offensive end and a defensive line-backer by the Texas Sports Writers Association. Kerry Herzog was named as an all-state Honorable Mention. Herzog completed 99 of 212 passes for 963 yards.

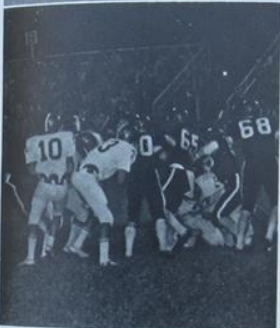

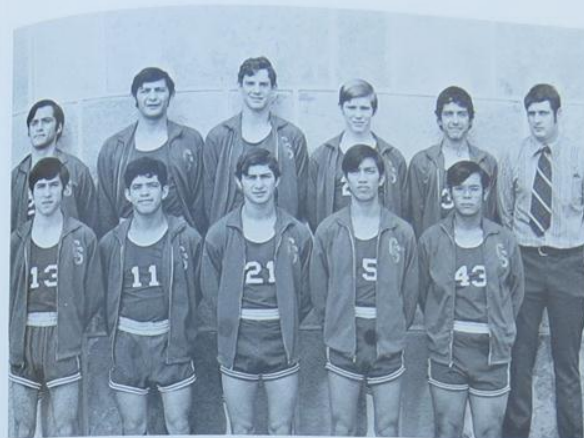
For the second straight year Elifonso Esquivel led the team from the free-

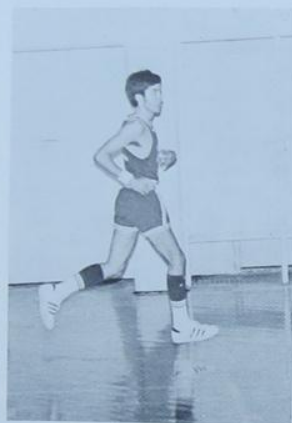

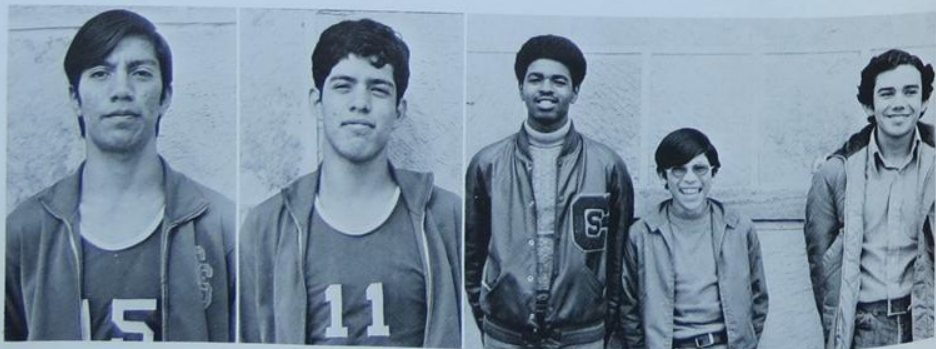


Boy's Junior Varsity Shows Improvement at End of Season

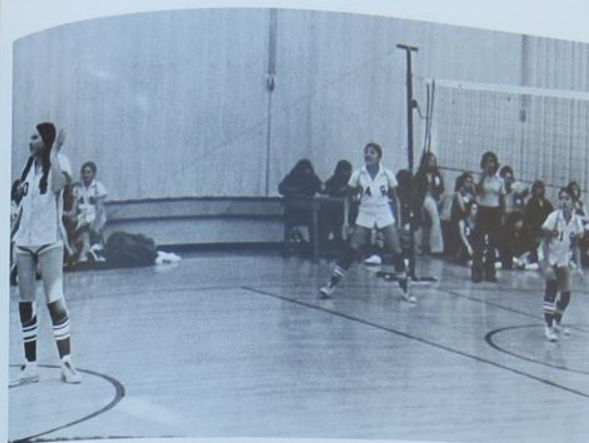

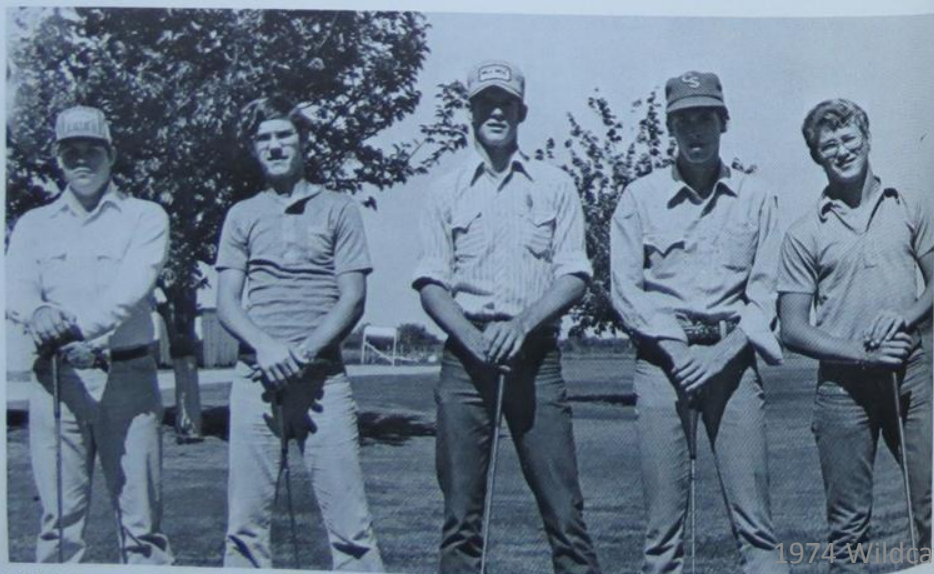

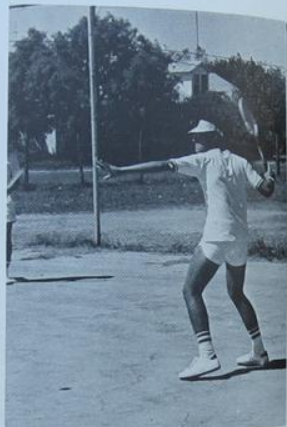

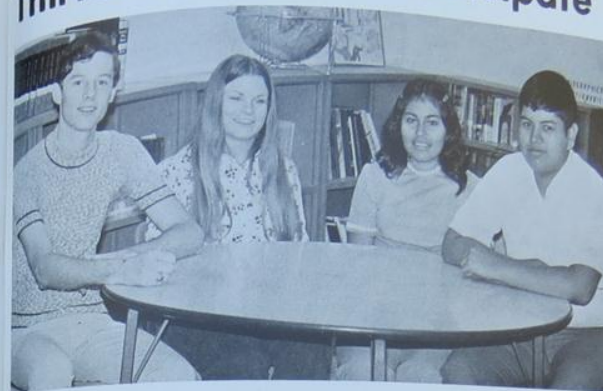

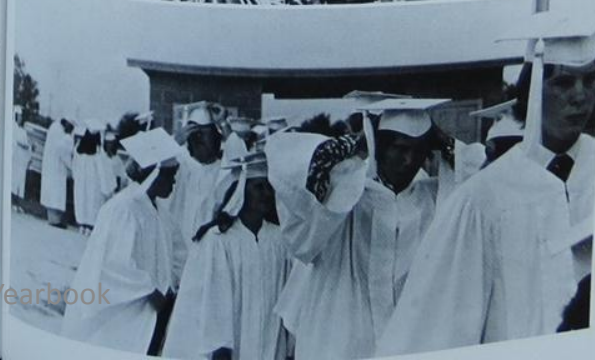

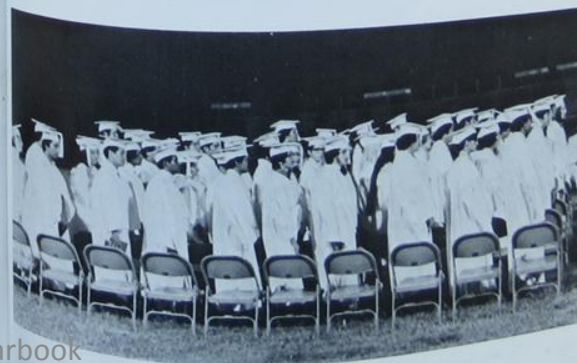
