

Mr. Carr, (left) a graduate from San Angelo State started teaching in 1971 for one year. This year he started teaching Biology here in CSHS.



## Cats Triumph Once Again!

The 1975 Wildcat football season came to an end on a winning note, as the Cats came from behind to defeat arch-rival Crystal City 15-14, in one of the closest games of the season.

The year started off on the right foot as the Wildcats defeated East Central and Dilley in scrimmages. Then the Cats went on to stomp Georgetwest in the first game of the season, by a score of 39-0.

The next four games were in preparation for district play. The Cats traveled to Laredo where they ran over the Longhorns 36-13. They then suffered two heartbreakers as they lost to Freer 7-0, in a defensive struggle, and to Devine 14-12. In the final non-district game against Cotulla, Carrizo totally destroyed an improved Cotulla team by the score of 47-0.

Carrizo had high hopes of winning the district opener against Uvalde, but the dreams were shattered as a powerful Uvalde squad outplayed Carrizo, 32-0. Uvalde was the only team to score two touchdowns, or more, against Carrizo all year.

The Cats hosted Fredricksburg and again lost a close game by the score of 7-0.

Carrizo won the three remaining games of the season, first by defeating Kerrville in the Homecoming game, 33-12. Carrizo then traveled to Southwest where they met their toughest opposition all year. Southwest led most of the time, but the Carrizo Springs Wildcats came back late in the game to pull it off 21-15. In the final game, the Carrizo Springs Wildcats defeated their long time rival the Crystal City Javalinas 15-14 in their closest game in all the years they have confronted Crystal. The Cats ended the season with a 6-4 record and tied for second in the zone.
























man David Alaniz. A committee was also appointed for publicizing the club's activities throughout the year. Anna Garcia and Rosemary Jasso did a fine job.









## Banquet Honors Football Boys





We hope that this will continue on into next year and years to come.


