






## Mathematics







These seniors put in extra effort and talents to help make the Wildcats little more proud to be Wildcats.



MORE VICTORIES to boost spirit, lift hopes and reward those who earned them.

The Carrizo Springs Wildcats began the 1972 season with a tie and two losses. In their first game, the Wildcats tied George West 6-6. Charlie Brown scored the lone Cat touchdown in a game marred by fumbles. In their next two games the Wildcats lost to Junction and Freer 13-6 and 24-7, respectively. Jeff English scored the Cats' only touchdown in both games. The Wildcats won their only game of the season against Laredo United.

Elifonoso Esquivel led the Cats to a 21-7 victory as he amassed 153 yards and scored a touchdown. Charlie Brown and Arturo Juarez also scored touchdowns. Following the victory the Cats lost to Pearsall and Dilly. In their seventh game of the season the Wildcats tied Cotulla, 7-7. Robert Howarth scored the Wildcats' touchdown. 
### Baseball Team Wins District!






