# Administrators Plan New High School



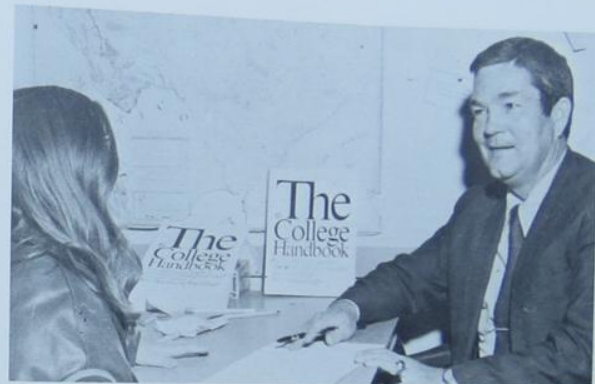
Superintendent W. S. TAYLOR (above) looks over plans for the new high school.

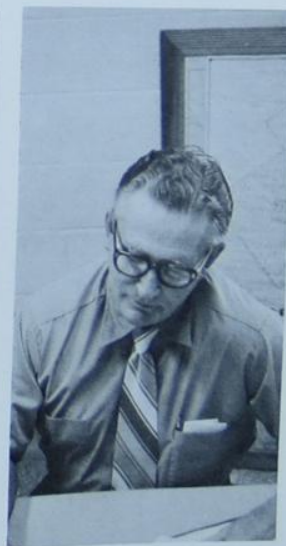

### Driver's Ed

The social studies department (below right) taught the students of C.S.H.S. about the present-day world, its governments, peoples and history. Members of the department were MR. JOE PHILLIPS, who taught Texas History, World Geography, American History and World History; MR. DUANE POWELL who taught American History; MRS. WINNELL ALBRECHT who instructed economics, civics and Texas history classes; and MR. JACK RAY, who was a newcomer to C.S.H.S. taught World History.



### Mathematics

The mathematics department (above) had to serve a large number of students. MRS. ELIZABETH ELLIS taught Related Math I. MRS. ALICE BLACKWELL taught Related Math II and two classes of biology. MR. JEROME GLASS taught Algebra I and Related Math II. MRS. OBDULIA BENDELE taught Analytical Geometry, Trigonometry, Algebra II and Plane Geometry.

### Music

MR. MORGAN LEETH instructed the C.S.H.S. band and choir. Under his guidance, the students taking these courses improved their musical abilities. His work was greatly appreciated.

### Library

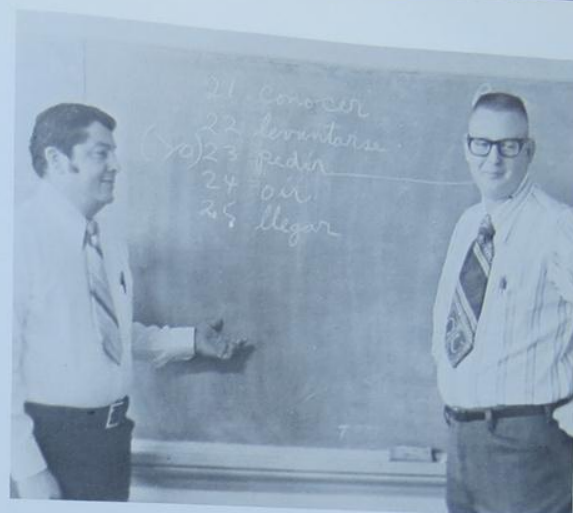

## Art

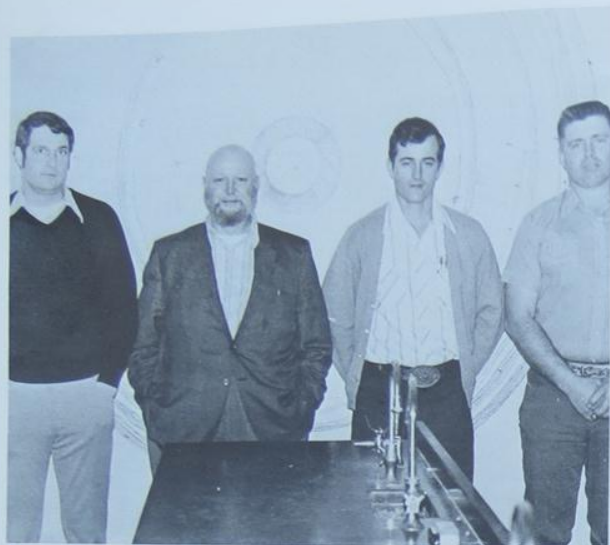
MRS. KRISTI HORTON'S art students (above left) worked with ceramics, pastels, water colors, ink, pencil, and charcoal drawings.

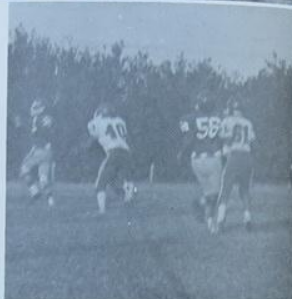


## B-Team Proves Successful

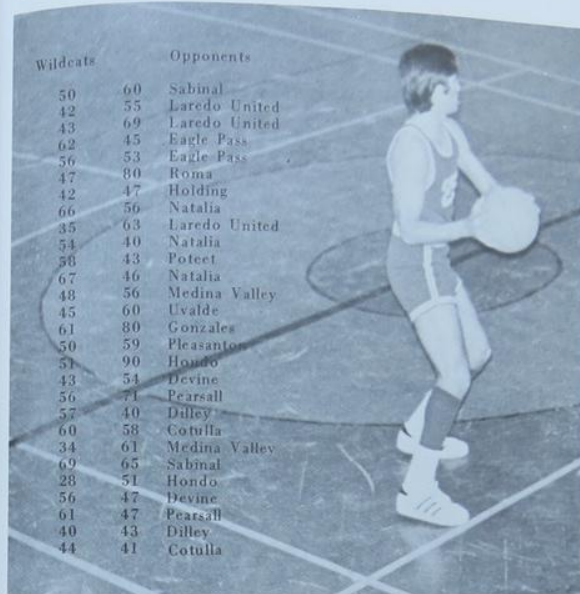

The 1972-73 Wildcats, beginning the season with only one returning letterman, had a strong second half finish as they won 6 out of their last 9 games and knocked off the powerful Devine Warhorses 56-47. Much of the success of the season was due to the Cat's senior big man, leading scorer (414 pts., 14.8 av.), and leading rebounder (393, 14 av.), Bob Kingsbery. Kingsbery had 9 games of 20 points or more with a game high of 28 against Natalia. Eight times during the year Kingsbery swept the boards for 17 or more rebounds with game highs of 30, 29, and 28 points. The 6'4" postman did suffer one great weakness as he fouled out of 16 different games which left much of the load on Elifonso Esquivel. Esquivel, the 5'8" floor general, went over the 20 point mark on 6 occasions during the season with game highs of 30 against Pearsall and 26 against Natalia. Many of Esquivel's 344 points came from the Charity line as he led the team by hitting 102 out of 144 attempts for 71% against AAAA Eagle Pass. Eli hit 16 of 18 for the game and 13 of 14 during the last quarter as the Cat's came from behind for a thrilling 56-53 victory.

One of the most improved players over the year was junior postman Hector Saenz. Saenz, slowed by a sprained ankle during the first part of the season, came on strong to finish the season with an 8.6 scoring average and a 7.3 rebounding average. His best game was in the Wildcat's 69-65 win over Sabinal as he scored 12 points and grabbed 21 rebounds.

Mike Mena was the only returning letterman from the year before. The senior forward had game highs of 19 and 20 points as he finished the season with 228 points for an 8.1 average. Rounding out the five starters was junior forward Robert Martinez. Strong bench strength came from sophomore guard Jesse Alaniz. Alaniz used for his tenacious defense excellent ball handling and coolness from the free throw line. He came into many last minute crucial situations. The remainder of the bench was senior postman John Spinks, senior guard Arturo Munoz, and sophomore guard Robert Romos.

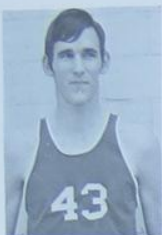

## B-Team Players Show Drive

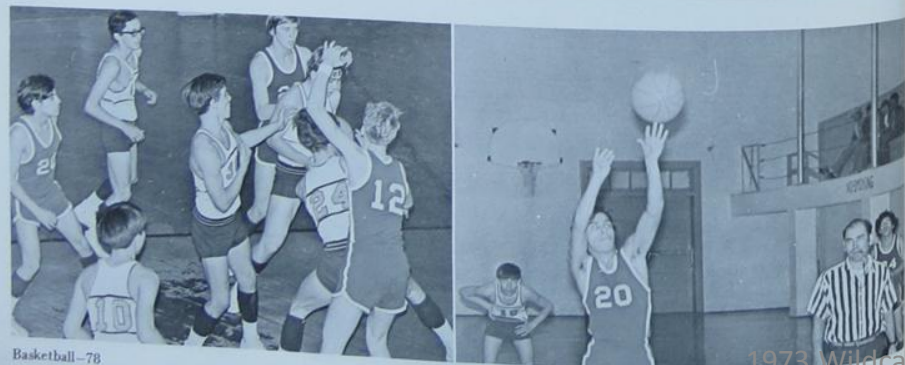

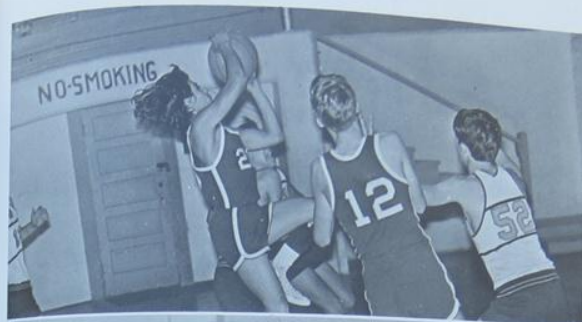

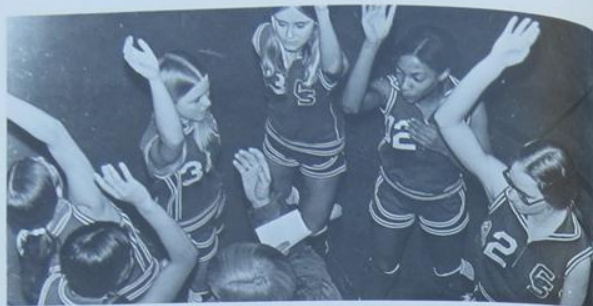


## Girls' B-Team Has Good Season

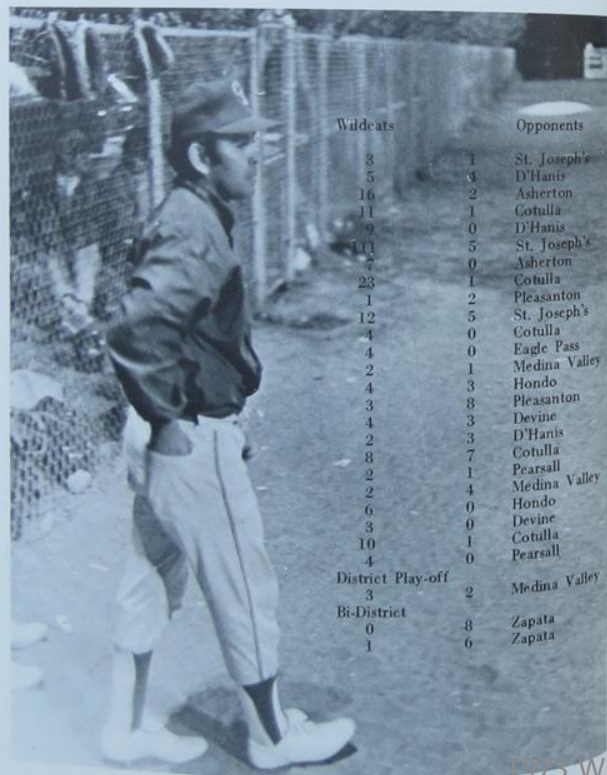
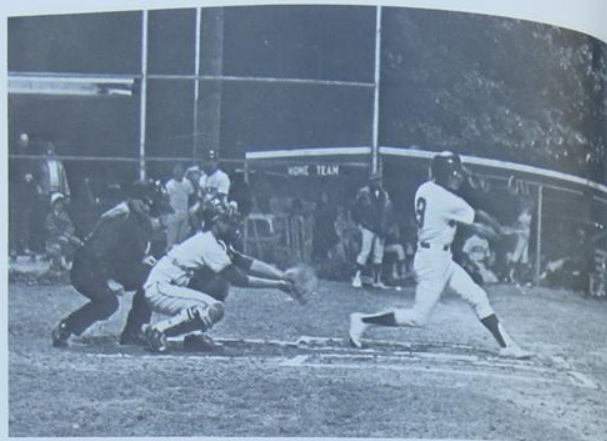
# Baseball Team Wins District!

# Golf Team Places Fourth in District

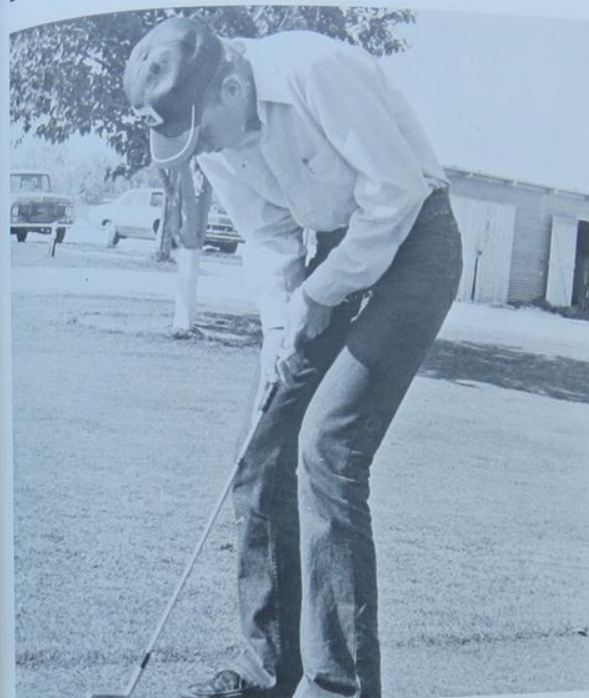

But this didn't upset the Wildcats and the track team placed third with a total of 81½ points. The mile-relay team placed first at this meet. 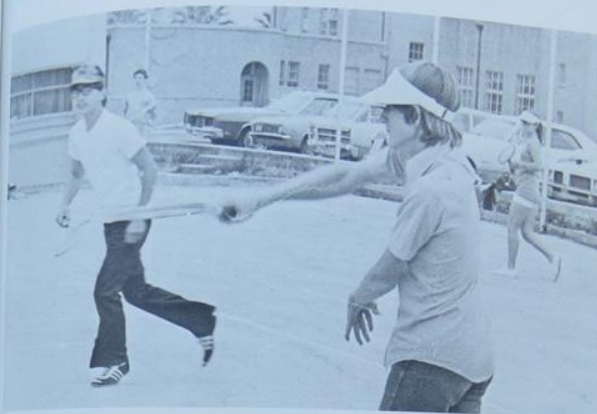

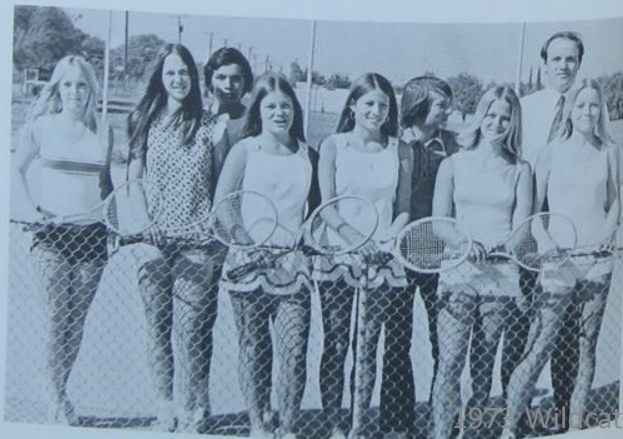

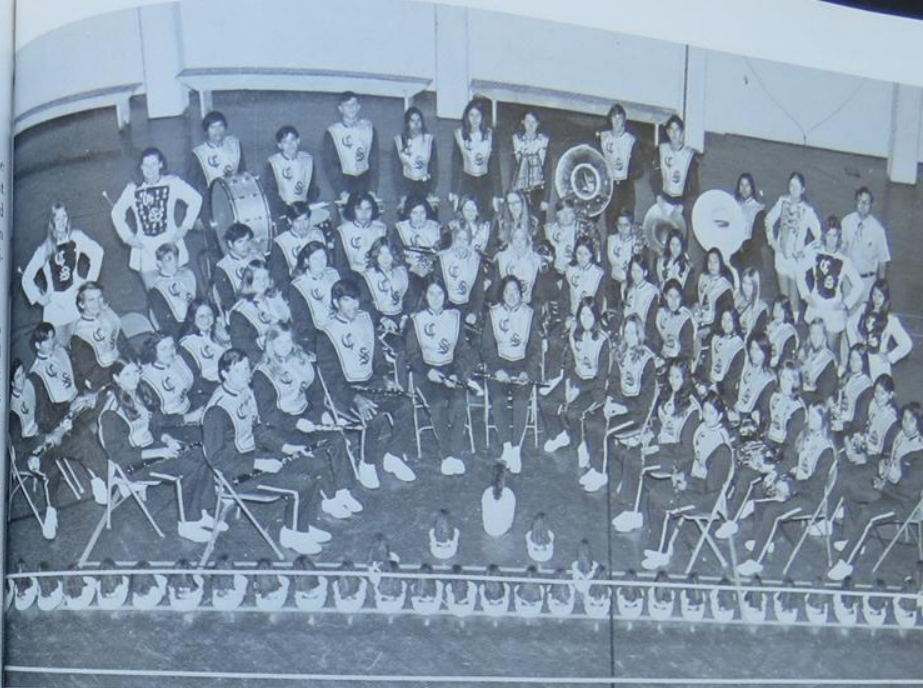

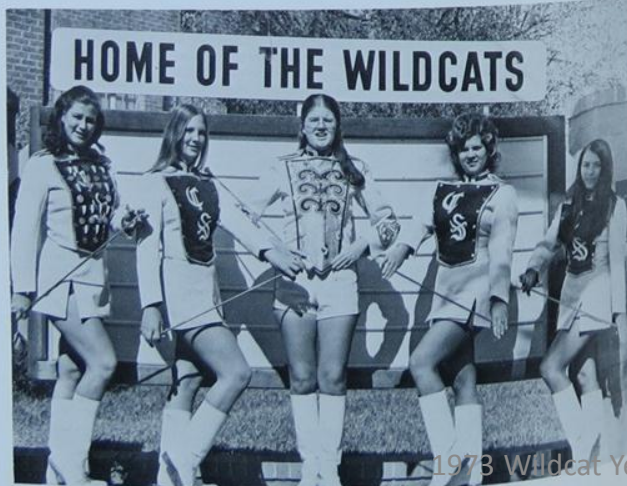

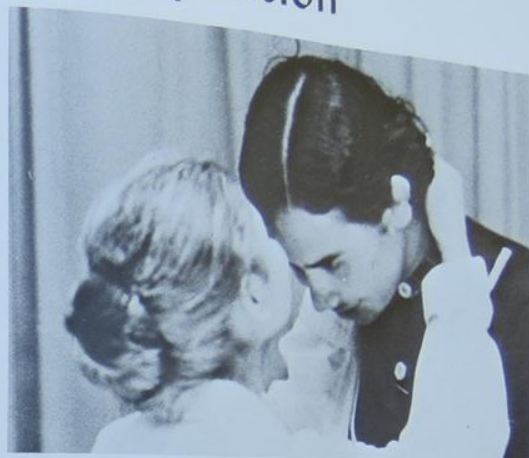

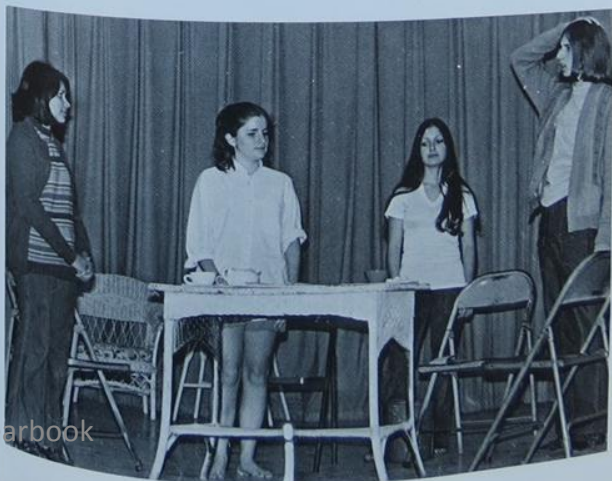

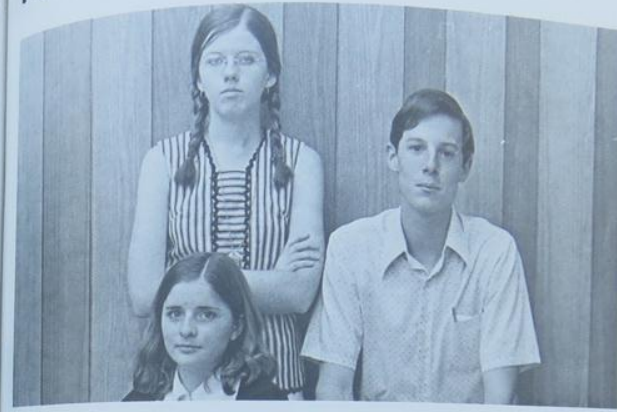
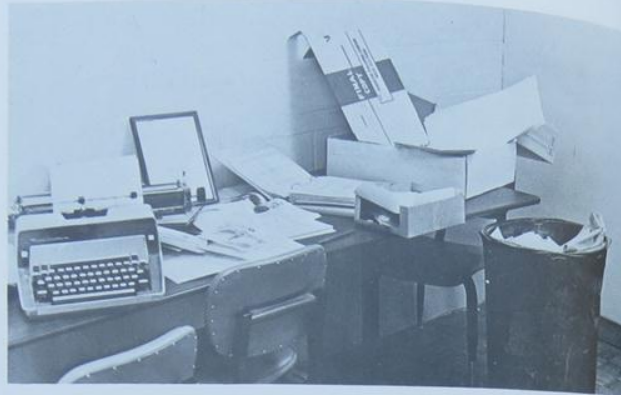

The student council is the governing body of the school. The representatives make many important decisions which affect the entire student body. They are able to run for student council a student must have a "B" average.

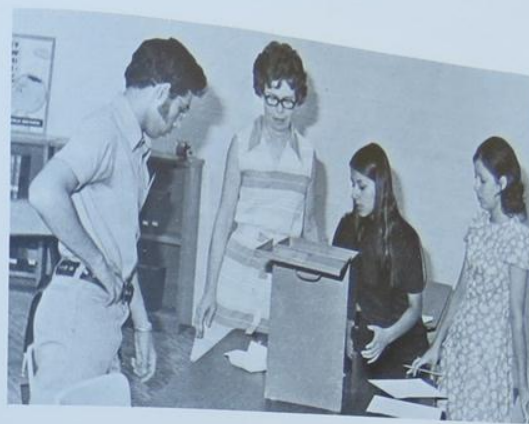

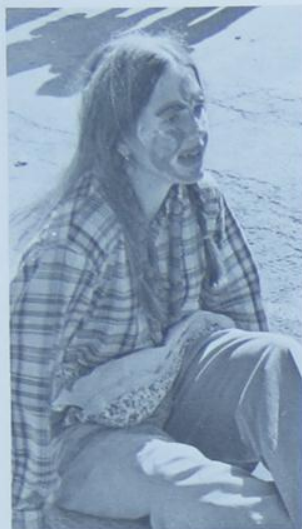

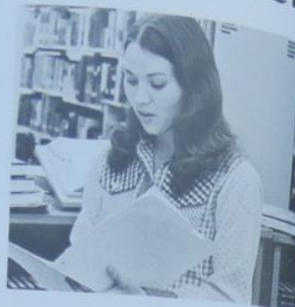
All these students showed their pride in C.S.H.S. by training for these contests and our school was well represented at the district meet.
