







ADMINISTRATORS' YEAR IN NEW BUILDING **RUNS SMOOTHLY**



VARSITY HAS SUCCESSFUYEAR IN NEW DISTRICT

Finishing the season with a big victory over arch-rival Crystal City, the varsity football team ended the 1974 season with a 6-4 overall record as the Wildcats were in a completely new district with different and tougher competition.

In district play the Wildcats, under the direction of Head Coach Bob Pyssen and Assistant Coaches Al Ringo, Jack Ray, Richard Bryant, compiled a record of two wins and three losses, losing to Uvalde, Fredericksburg, and Kerrville. Finishing in fourth place in the West Zone of class 14-AAA, the Wildcats proved to be tough

The Wildcats coaching staff felt that the 1974 football season was probably the best defensive effort put out by the Wildcats in a long time. Support and spirit behind the Cats was great and is already building for the 1975 season.

Out of our hard-working team, 13 were named as outstanding players in the class 14-AAA West Zone All Zone Team. Senior Billy John and Junior Donald Rutledge gained positions in both the offensive and defensive teams. Other players named to the offensive unit were Senior Bobby Keswick and Junior Wesley Whitman and on the defensive unit was Junior Elias Esquivel. Players that received Honorable Mention on offense were Seniors Lenis Moonen, George Sifuentes, and Johnny Campos and Junior Roy Smith; and on defense were Seniors Kip Box and Jerry Gore, Junior Freddy Rios, and Sophomore Ruben Gutierrez. Out of all these players, Senior Billy John was named to the All State Team.

The 1974 varsity football team consisted of eleven Seniors, sixteen Juniors, and one sophomore.

As a group these young men strove to prove that they were the best and learned how to win and lose not only in football but also in their own lives. These men proved to other AAA teams that a small town like Carrizo Springs was a town to be looked upon with respect.

Finishing in third place, the junior varsity ended the season with a record of three wins and seven losses. The wins were against Del Rio, Cotulla, and Crystal City. The captains were George Ortiz, Gregg Howard, and Leandro Ortiz. Some outstanding players on offense were split end Ray Vallego, running back Steven Rivera, and tight end Juan Rubalcava; on defense were free safety Leandro Ortiz, who stole seven interceptions; linebacker Arturo Rios; defensive end Juan Rubalcava; and defensive tackles George Ortiz and Gregg Howard. Quarterback was Moises Morones and fullback was Jaime Santos. Basketball Team Stages Comeback

The 1974-75 basketball season saw the Wildcats finish with a 15-19 record in their first season in District 14-AAA. The Cats were coached by Bob Pyssen.

Billy John, the Senior postman, was the team's leading scorer with a 15.4 average per game. Lenis Moonen and Robert Ramos followed with averages of 10.8 and 9.1 respectively. Mario Minjares, the team's only Junior, scored at a 7.2 clip. Jesse Alaniz, and Mack Mandell downed the remaining starting positions, Bench strength consisted of Johnny Duran, Johnny Campos, Carlos Villarreal, Herbert Gilbert and Juan Rojas.

In district competition Carrizo finished with a 6-4 record which marked the first winning season since 1970. The Cats took all five of their home games including a one-point victory over arch-rival Crystal City. The highlight of the Varsity season was their 48-42 win over Kerrville Tivy. The loss was Tivy's first in district play in four years.



The Freshman team also put out a lot of effort. They had several winning games. Both the B-Team and Freshman team were under the direction of Coach Glass.




















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Tennis Players Have Fine Season



It is the old and the new combining again.


