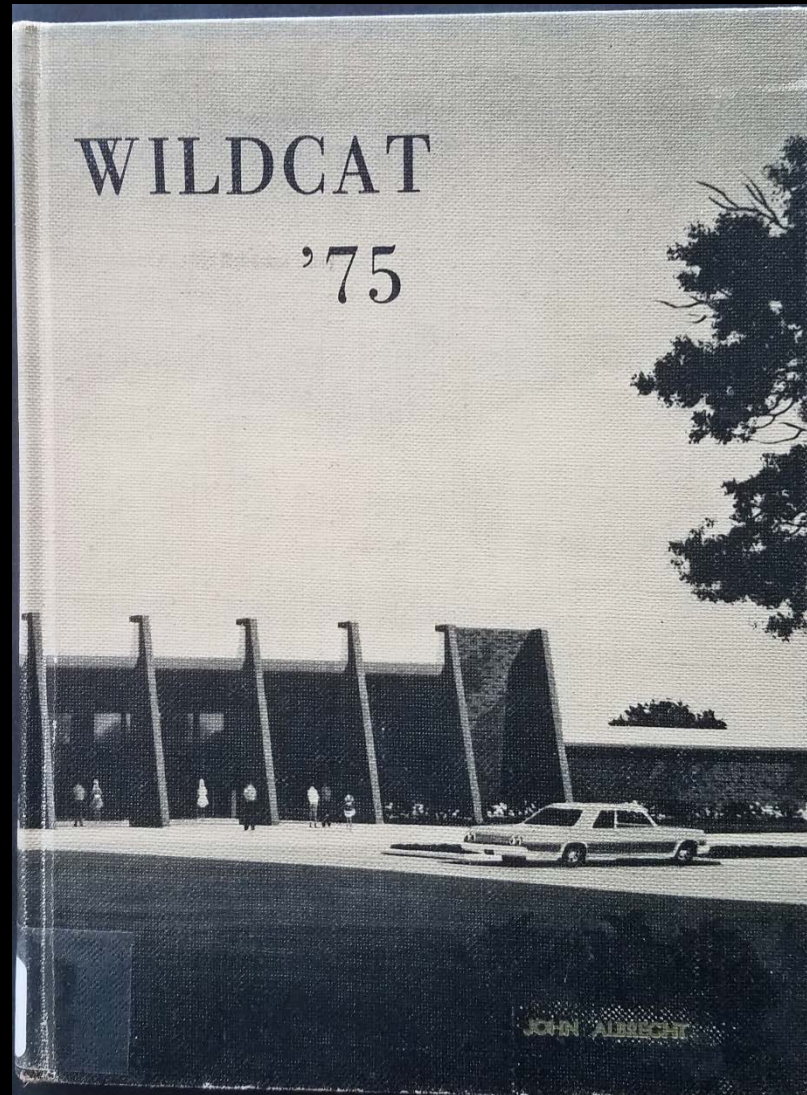

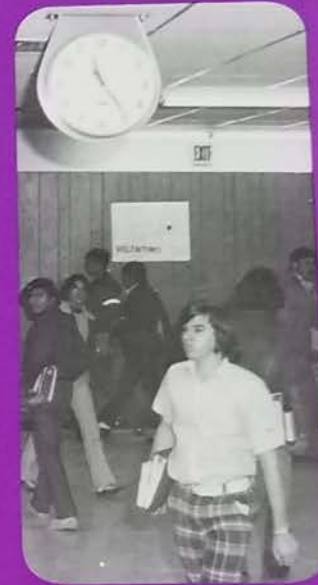

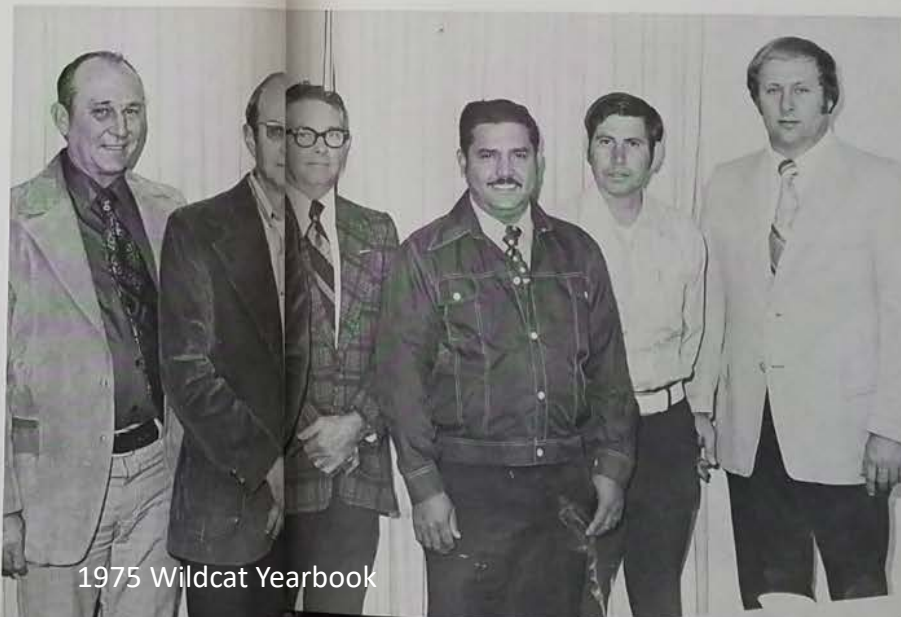


ADMINISTRATORS' YEAR IN NEW BUILDING RUNS SMOOTHLY

Science

Library

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Powell, librarian, was essential in producing a library that was well-equipped and a service to all students. She constantly was seen working to try to satisfy students and teachers in their needs for material of great interest to the student body. The number of books in the library, old and new, exceeded seven thousand and were all kept up-to-date. Mrs. Powell was also in

charge of preparing fine lists every six weeks. The funds from fines were used to replace lost books and to order new books as well. She was assisted in her desk work by a group of twelve students who enrolled in a Library Science course and who strived to keep order in the library and who learned through experience the techniques of processing books and magazines.



Driver's Ed

The Driver Education instructors taught students the procedures to safely drive automatic automobiles. The minimum age at which students could enroll was sixteen with parental approval.

The projects undertaken by Driver Education pupils included drawing traffic signs, answering questions relating to the subjects and driving a minimum of six hours.

Al Ringo and Bob Pyssen were the Driver Education instructors for 1974-75.

Wildcat Band Directors and choir instructors were Morgan Leeth and Joe Blades.



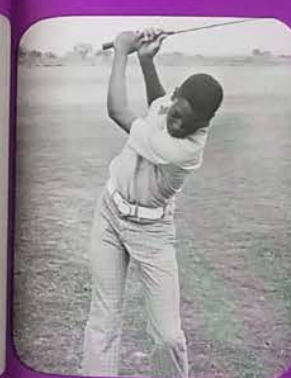
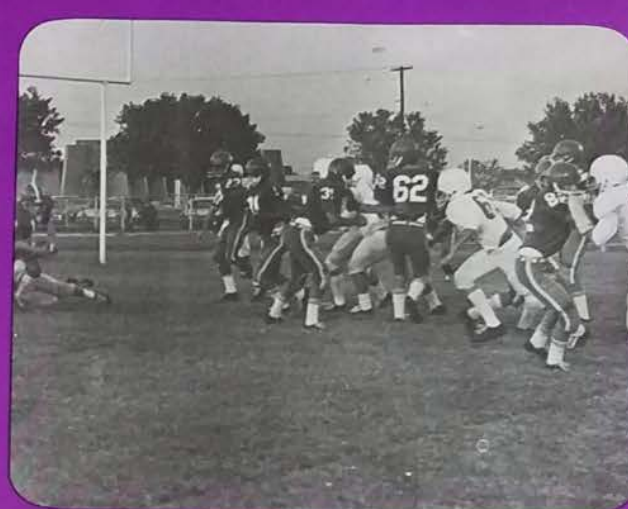
Transportation And Maintenance

The 1974 junior varsity football team, coached by Jack Ray and Richard Bryant, entered a new conference, the Border Conference. Finishing in third place, the junior varsity ended the season with a record of three wins and seven losses. The wins were against Del Rio, Cotulla, and Crystal City. The captains were George Ortiz, Gregg Howard, and Leandro Ortiz. Some outstanding players on offense were split end Ray Vallego, running back Steven Rivera, and tight end Juan Rubalcava; on defense were free safety Leandro Ortiz, who stole seven interceptions; linebacker Arturo Rios; defensive end Juan Rubalcava; and defensive tackles George Ortiz and Gregg Howard. Quarterback was Moises Morones and fullback was Jaime Santos. Other offensive players included Elias Perez, Enrique Flores, and Juan Cadena as linemen; other defensive players included Richard Zarate, Roy Martinez on the secondary, and Ruben Nolasco and Juan Cadena on the defensive line.

Basketball Team Stages Comeback

The 1974-75 basketball season saw the Wildcats finish with a 15-19 record in their first season in District 14-AAA. The Cats were coached by Bob Pyssen.

Billy John, the Senior postman, was the team's leading scorer with a 15.4 average per game. Lenix Moonen and Robert Ramos followed with averages of 10.8 and 9.1 respectively. Mario Minjares, the team's only Junior, scored at a 7.2 clip. Jesse Alaniz, and Mack Mandell downed the remaining starting positions. Bench strength consisted of Johnny Duran, Johnny Campos, Carlos Villarreal, Herbert Gilbert and Juan Rojas.

In district competition Carrizo finished with a 6-4 record which marked the first winning season since 1970. The Cats took all five of their home games including a one-point victory over arch-rival Crystal City. The highlight of the Varsity season was their 48-42 win over Kerrville-Tivy. The loss was Tivy's first in district play in four years.

Varsity Has Winning Season

For the first time since 1962, the Girl's Varsity Basketball Team had a winning season. The Cats, under the direction of Coach Theresa Wagner posted an outstanding 18-14 record.

Lolly Saenz was the team's leading scorer with a total of 502 points. Tina Munoz was second with 394, and Linda Majek pumped in 248 points. Ann Lansford, sharing a starting guard position, scored 99 points. Laura Ayers was the leading rebounder, followed closely by Beth Stephenson and Kim Mitchell.

The high point of the season was the Cotulla Tournament. In the championship game against Dilley, the Wildcats took the first place trophy with a thrilling 59-49 win. Lolly Saenz was named to the All-tournament team.

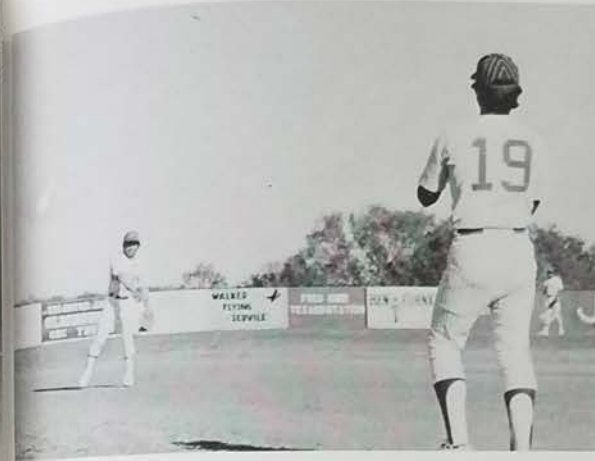

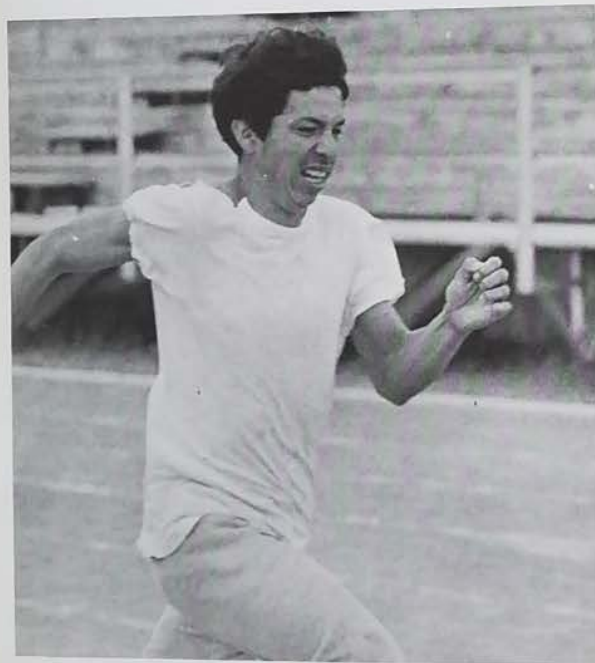

Volleyball Team Has Winning Season

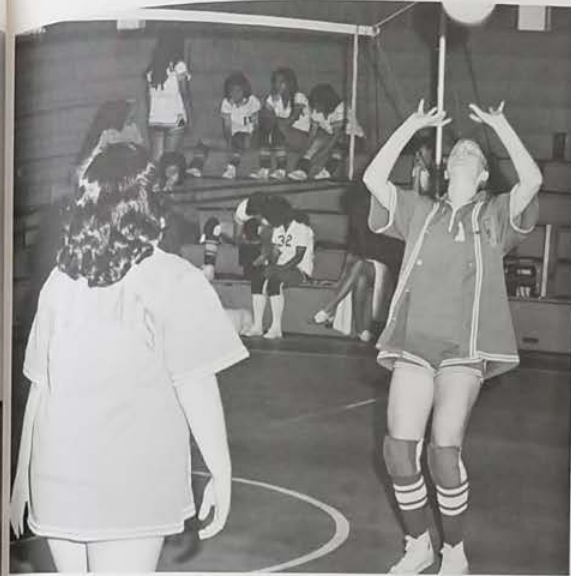

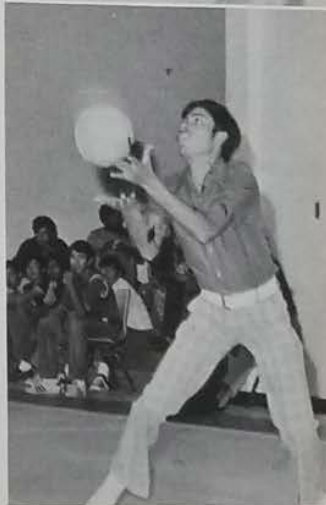
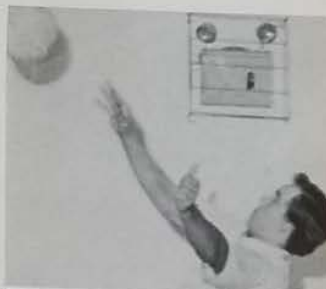

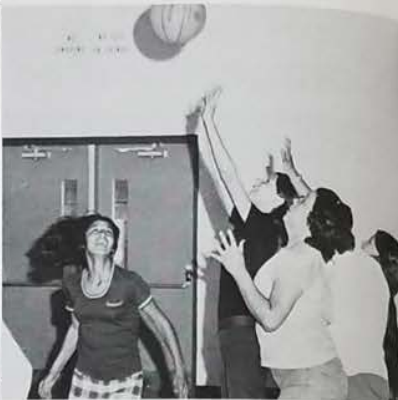

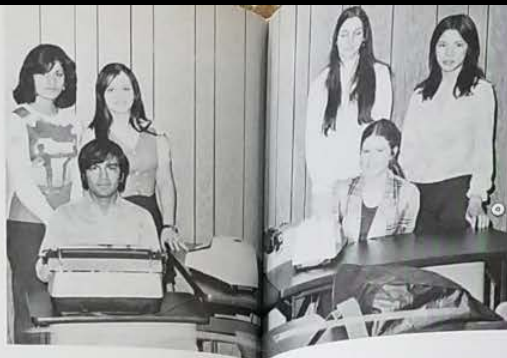

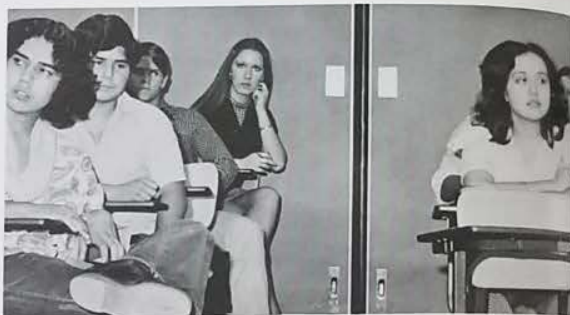

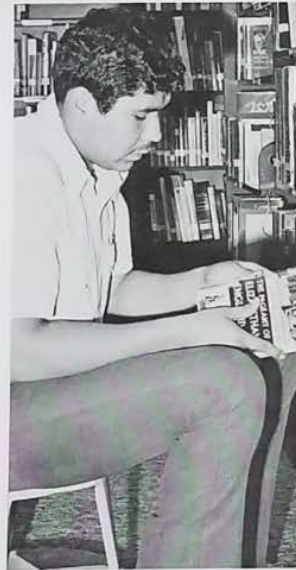

Another activity that the members were involved in was a dance in which FHA and FFA members cooperated for the expenses. At the dance, members of the

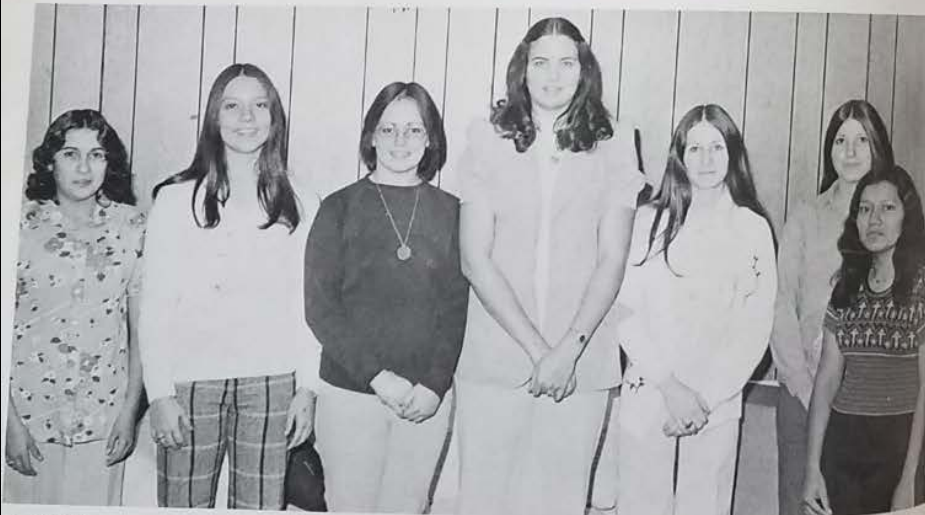

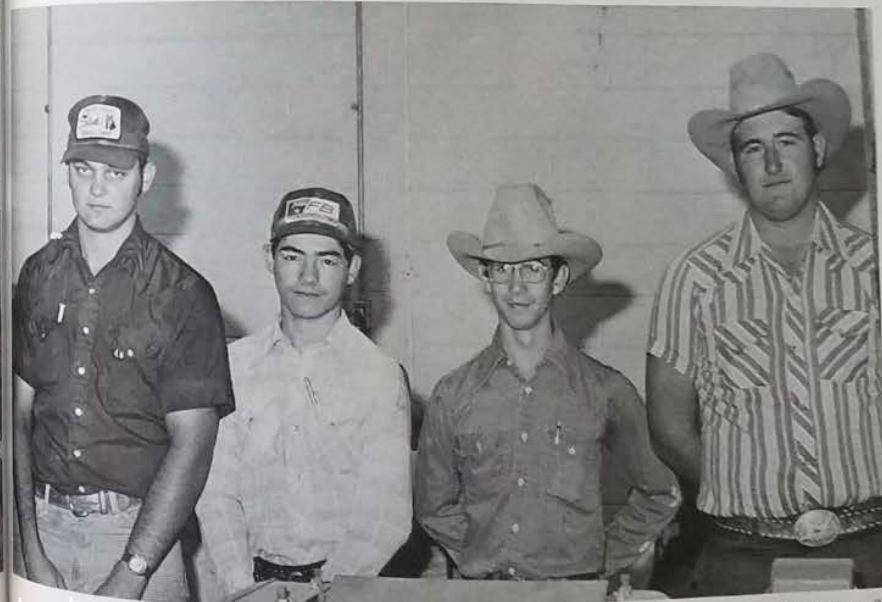

In Baseball, pitcher Rey Vallejo got recognition for his win-loss record.

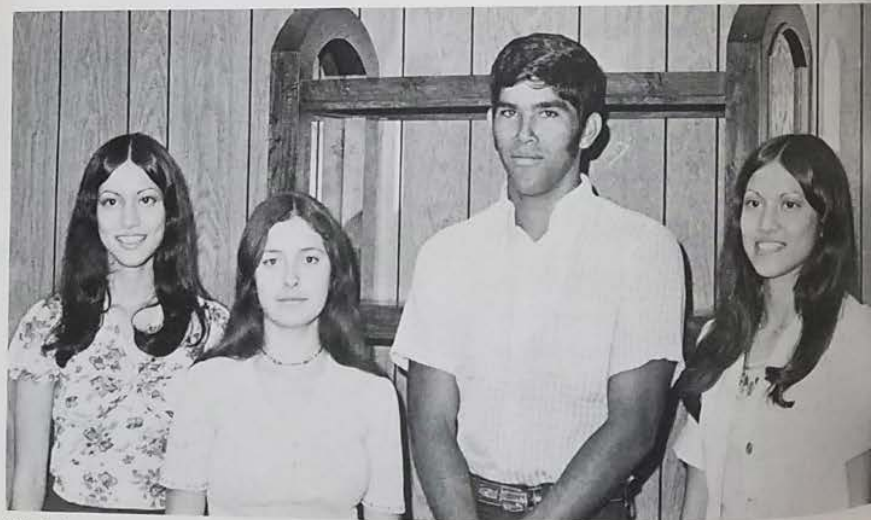

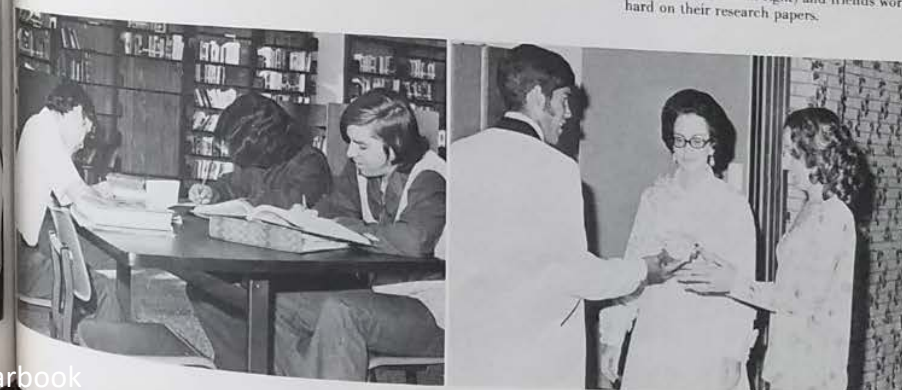

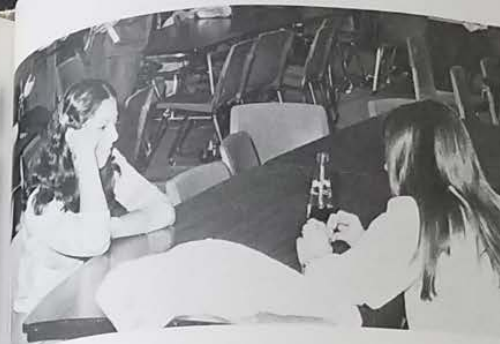

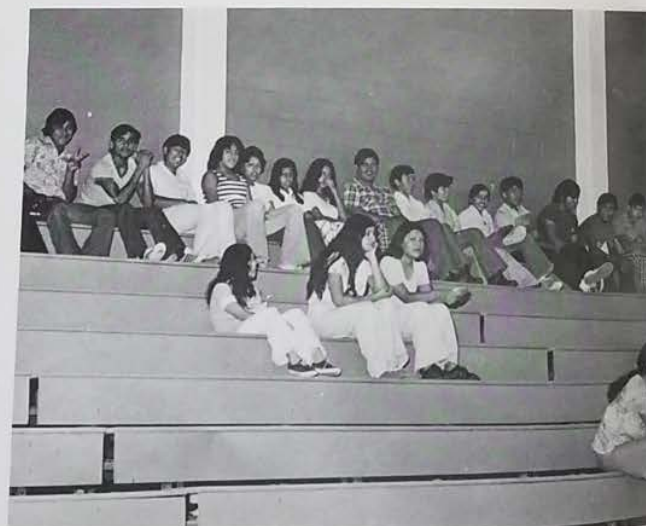
