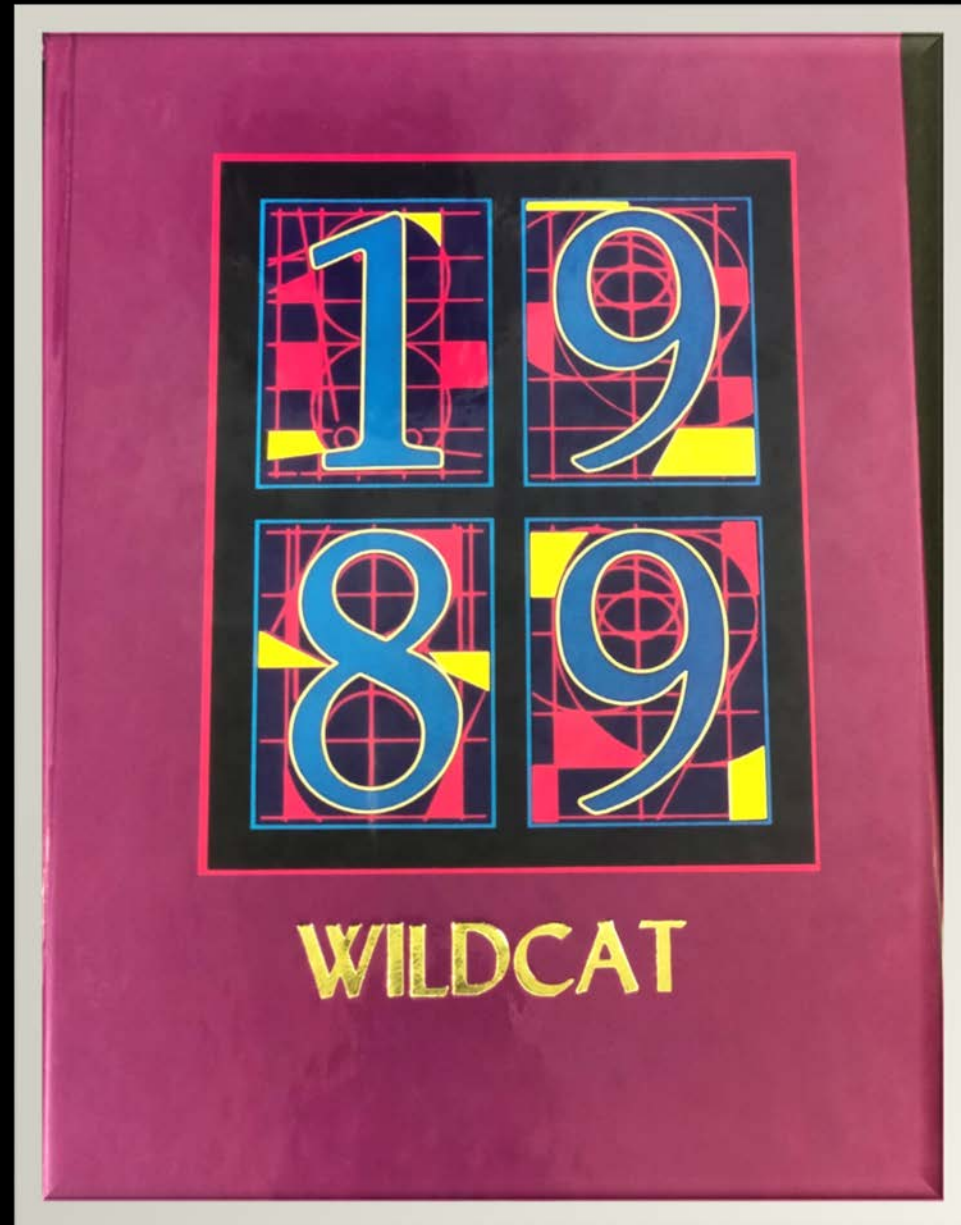

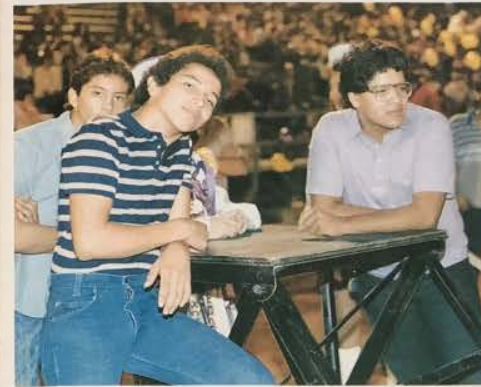

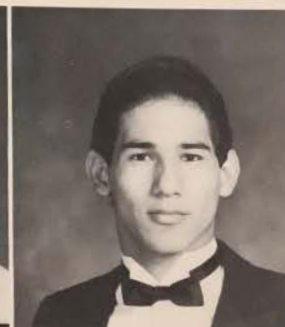
Yearly Activities
