Students enrolled in this program must complete a minimum of 525 working hours and pass employeer evaluations. Students are also required to take an office administration course with Mrs. Pacheco, in which she teaches business skills ranging from correct phone answering and message taking to balancing check and record books.

### "Up All Night, Sleep All Day ..."


