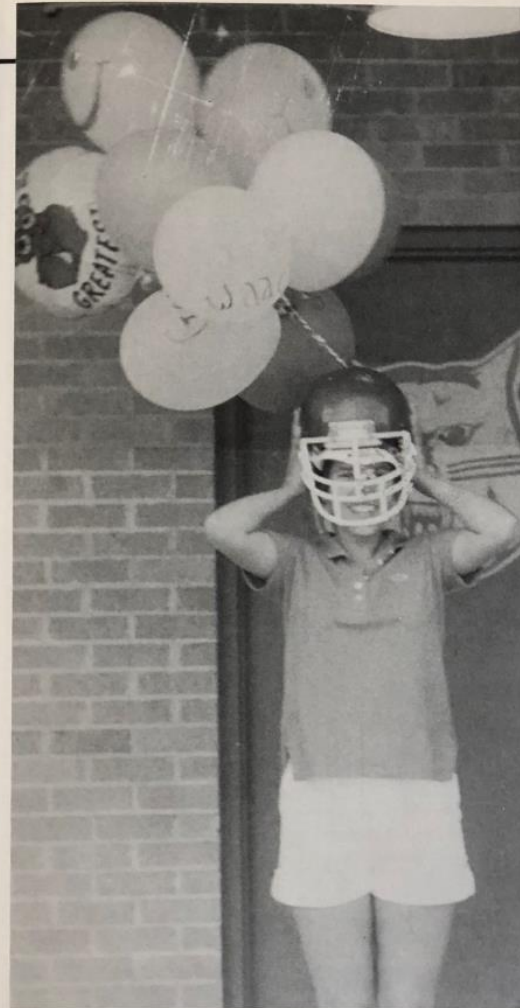

under the direction of Mr. Leo Garza, has worked hard to please the crowds, and did a great job of it.

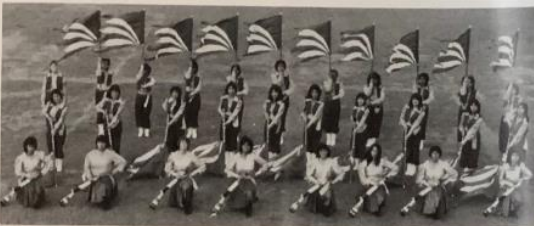
The M.P.B. is not only the Marching Band, they are also the Symphonic, and Concert bands,

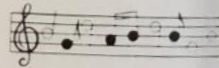
After all that excitement, the choir had a big job on their hands. They had to put on a Christmas Concert without the Band. Well they did an excellent job at that as well.

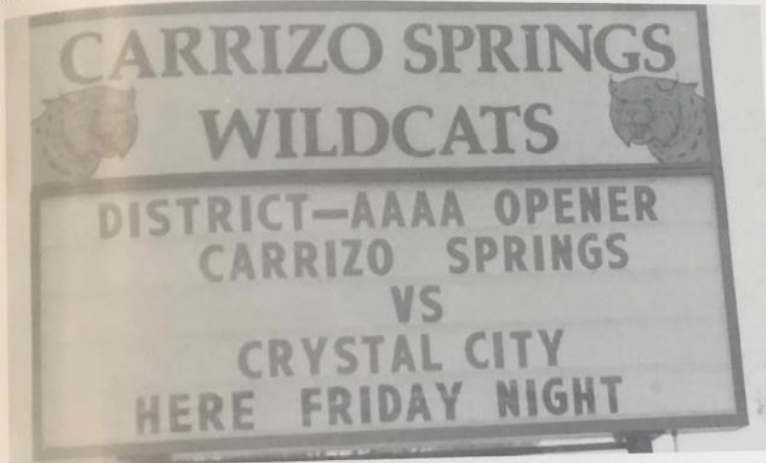


KEY CLUB

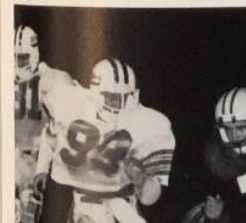
The Cats had 22 seniors on the team, which will be dearly missed.

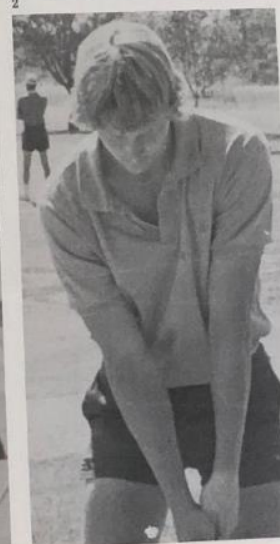
GOLF TEAM TO STATE AGAIN!
